**BOTTLE IS RECOVERED
AFTER LONG JOURNEY**

Quebec, April 1.—A bottle thrown
overboard from the Canadian gov-
ernment exploration ship Arctic, in
the vicinity of Cape Farewell, Green-
land, on July 21, 1923, was picked
up on the beach at Port-of-Ness,
Stornoway, Ross-shire, Scotland, on
March 7, 1924. Advice to this effect
has been received here by Adrien
Ralarau, of this city, who put the
bottle in the water. He had gone
north on the Arctic to act as crown
prosecutor at the trial of two Eskimo
men for murder, who have since been
hanged.
The bottle had travelled more than
a thousand miles across the North
Atlantic.

TOWNSHIP WILL PROVIDE BRIDGE ON BRISCOE ST.

Petition Signed by 35 Granted,
Providing People Do Work
Themselves.

FRANCHISE GRANTED

If residents of Manor Park want
a bridge or culvert over the second
ravine on Briscoe street, the West-
minster Township council will pro-
vide the necessary material if the
people do the work free of charge.

A deputation consisting of Mrs.
William Heggall, Mrs. Annie Evison
and H. A. Wheeler presented a peti-
tion asking for the bridge signed by
35 residents. The answer of the
council to their pleas will be taken
up at the next meeting of the Manor
Park Progressive Association.

One resident of the township who
resides in the park bitterly arraign-
ed the manner in which relief was
doled out in the park, declaring there
were individuals receiving relief who
were not deserving it. He declared
that it was not fair and something should be
done about it.

The council decided to grant the
Byron Telephone Company a fran-
chise to place poles on all township
and county roads.

David McEwan asked for an ex-
tension of hydro in the township
and was referred to District Hydro
Engineer Hughes.

Two road scrapers were ordered
purchased for use on township roads.
Relief bills totalling \$50 were or-
dered paid, as were numerous other
bills.

BOARD OF WORKS HOLD UNUSUALLY QUIET SESSION

Members Let Up On Slashing
Festivities of Past Few
Days.

BUSINESS ROUTINE

After the estimate slashing festi-
vities of the past few days the regular
session of the board of works yester-
day was a picture of quietness and
contentment. Routine business drew
the attention of the members and
controversies of major importance
were entirely lacking.

Weston street residents, petitioning
against a sewer, were represented by
Mr. Steel who recalled that they had
filed an official complaint before the
Wellington-High street sewer job was
approved. It was decided to leave
this work until the last, upon the
chance that further developments
would obviate a change in the system.

In connection with the plans for
the contemplated sewer disposal plant
for the Wellington-High street job,
the committee accepted City En-
gineer Near's recommendation that
the consulting services of D. J.
Dallin, of the provincial department
of health, be acquired at certain in-
tervals, and at an estimated cost of
\$500 or \$700.

Residents on the west side of Gam-
mage street, Knollwood Park, pe-
titioned for a chlder walk. The com-
mittee proposes to initiate a concrete
walk.

The engineer reported that the pro-
vincial health authorities have ap-
proved of the Mount Pleasant sewer
extension and the revised plumbing
bylaw. The latter is now effective.

The committee authorized the pay-
ment of \$355 to the Milton Hersey
Company, this amount being charged
to the street railway company as its
share of the cost of paving testing
for the Richmond, Briscoe and Stan-
ley street projects of 1923.

Ald. Allan Towe recommended that
while stripes be painted across Dun-
das street from Loew's Theatre to the
south side of the street, as a guide
to pedestrians and to present "jay
walking" between that point and the
corner of Dundas and Richmond
streets.

Several contracts were awarded, in
all cases the lowest tender being ac-
cepted. Among them were: Hayman
& Mills, William Copp, Heaman &
Sons, Brick Manufacturing and Sup-
ply Company; U. S. Asphalt and Re-
fining Company, and the Canada
Foundry Company.

In connection with the contract for
castings, Ald. Warren questioned
whether it would be more advisable
to purchase this material from a local
firm, regardless of tender.

GUEST OF HONOR.

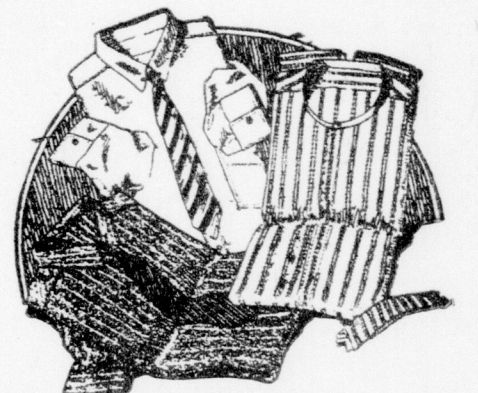

NON-JURY SITTINGS OPENED YESTERDAY

Action of H. J. Heath Against
Harry Ranahan Is Con-
cluded.

The county court non-jury sittings
opened before Judge Talbot Macbeth
at the court house yesterday morning.

Nineteen cases, mostly motor car
actions, are scheduled for trial.
The case of Henry J. Heath, Lon-
don Township farmer, against Harry
Ranahan, local grocer, was concluded
yesterday afternoon, judgment being
reserved till today. Mr. Heath claimed
\$325 for damages to his motor
car which rammed Ranahan's car on
Oct. 13, 1922, at the corner of St.
James and Richmond streets. This
plaintiff claims the defendant's car
pulled in ahead of his motor and
stopped without any warning.
The defendant denies any negli-
gence on his part, and claims Mr.
Heath was to blame. Mr. Heath, his
wife and Gordon Guest gave evidence
for the prosecution, and Harry Rana-

han, A. J. Flannery, Geo. Robinson,
Eugene Durant, Cyril F. Sullivan and
Grant Wiley, for the defence this
morning. Wm. Henderson acted
for the plaintiff and Albert Murphy
for the defence.

FEDERAL GRAND JURY INDICTS HARRY SINCLAIR

Washington, March 31.—Harry F.
Sinclair, lessee of Teapot Dome, was
indicted by federal grand jury here
today on contempt charges growing

out of his refusal to testify before
the Senate oil committee.
The indictment was in ten counts,
each referring to a specific question
asked the oil operator when he was
last before the committee. The grand
jurors held that these questions, all
of which Sinclair refused to answer,
were "pertinent to the matters and
questions then under inquiry before
the said committee."

for Toronto, intending to make some
business calls, but the calls were not
made. Mr. Sibree is 50 years of age,
weighs 200 pounds, is 5 foot 8 inches in
height, and has dark hair and a small
moustache.

SAYS PERSIAN REPUBLIC CONTRARY TO RELIGION

Tehran, Persia, April 1.—Premier
Nushir-Eddowles has issued a pro-
clamation, declaring that a repu-
blic for Persia is contrary to the Islam
religion.
It prohibits all mention of a
public under threat of penalties.
Recent Tehran dispatches report
that the Persian parliament
abandoned the idea of a republic,
had deposed the Shah, deciding
place his two-year-old son on
throne.
