

DISREGARD OF LAW EVIL, SAYS MINISTER

Rev. James McCrae Preaches
in First Presbyterian
Church.

The root of the greatest evil in the world today is found largely in the decaying respect for authority, was brought out by the Rev. James McCrae who occupied the pulpit at First Presbyterian church last night.

The Rev. James McCrae is the son of the late Rev. D. L. McCrae, beloved London minister who passed away a short time ago. He delivered a stirring sermon on the subject of "The Mastery of Christ."

Taking his text from John xiii. 13, he quoted the great historian Ferraro of Italy who blamed the present unrest to lack of respect for authority. The time was coming when the truth of the statement would be realized, when people would cry out for mastery, he asserted. Child energies had to be controlled by more mature intelligence. A grown man might be led astray by his enthusiasm to the loss of his better judgment, except his enthusiasms be controlled by a higher power.

"We speak of science as having mastered nature, but unless the discoveries of science can be controlled by spiritual forces to serve the highest ends of humanity they must not be a blessing but a curse," he said. The prodigal son craved absolute freedom had reduced him to penury. Freedom had reduced him to penury did he return to demand mastery of his father. Jesus Christ claimed a mastery over, first, the religious thinking of the people; secondly, over their moral conduct; thirdly, over their religious practices.

"When people who today stand outside our church to criticize the shortcomings of professed Christians, while they in cordiality shrink to profession, when they will muster the courage they lack and undertake the unselfish asceticism which the submission to Christ's masterly demands, then we shall turn the world upside down for good, declared Rev. McCrae.

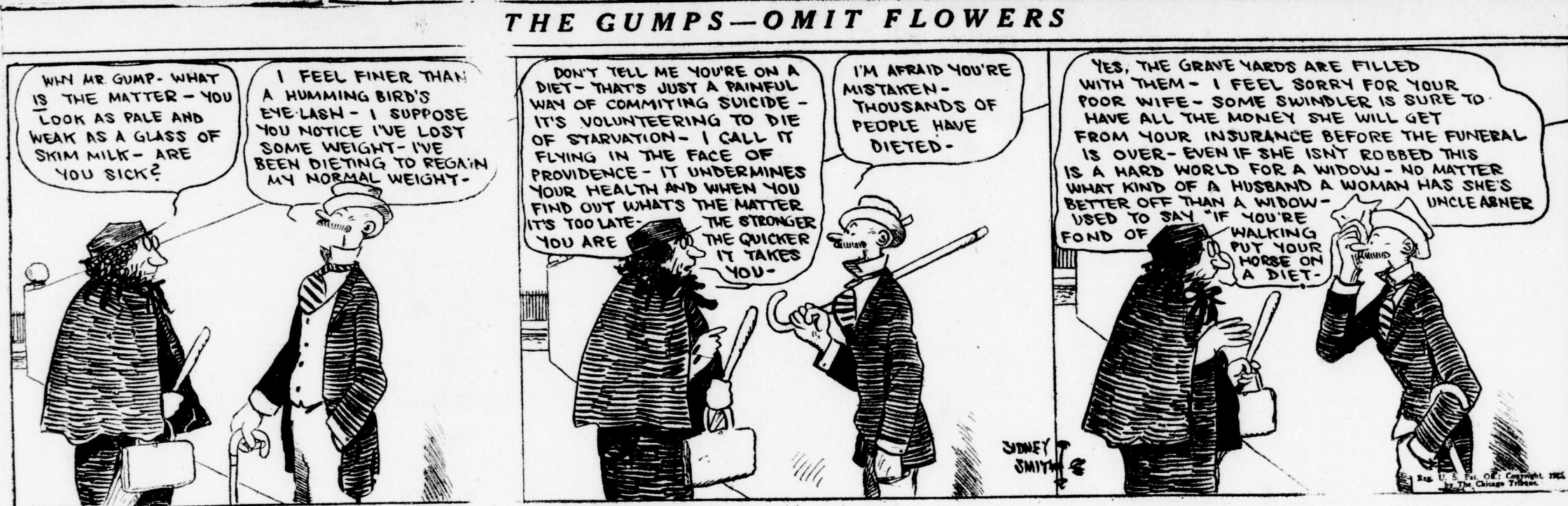

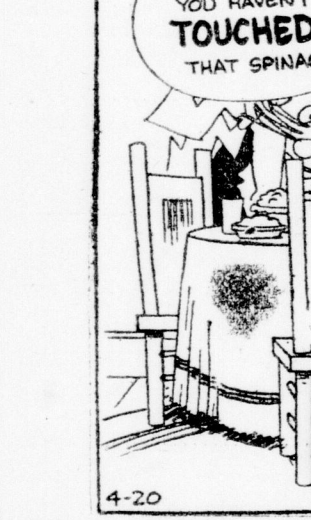

FEDERAL BUDGET WILL GET ACID TEST NEXT THURSDAY

Premier King and Meighen
Have Yet To Talk On
Subject.

BATTLE IS FORECAST

Ottawa Sees Election in On-
tario Before Federal
Contest.

Ottawa, April 19.—Division on the budget is expected to be taken Thursday. The House will first divide on the amendment disapproving of the budget and the financial statement in terms of want of confidence in the government, and when this is disposed of the budget itself will be voted on.

It has not been determined when the prime minister and Mr. Meighen will make their contributions to the discussion. In previous major debates, they have got in the way of jockeying for the last word, each desiring the other to precede him. It remains to be seen which of them will hold out the longest in this instance.

With the main discourse on the budget concluded, the subject will have to be gone over again in committee of ways and means. Wednes-

day will be again at the disposal of the private members for their resolutions after the budget division.

Freight Rates Bill to Come.

The principal measure of government legislation has yet to be introduced—that on freight rates equalization. At the insistence of Western members, Hon. T. A. Low has given assurance that the grain act amendments will be submitted to the house for approval. Other government legislation promised includes amendments to the criminal code aiming at the suppression of handbook gambling on horse races.

Whether Mr. Meighen now intends further attempt the extension of the session by a second tariff debate later on in connection with his resolution proposing a revival of the national policy is a matter for conjecture. So long as there is a prospect of cool weather in Ottawa members are not likely to manifest anxiety for early prorogation, and some, no doubt, will be content to join in the discussion. The Conservative leader has been assured by Mr. Mackenzie King of a chance to move his resolution.

The Senate resumes on Tuesday after its prolonged recess, but will have so little to do that probably it will have to take another adjournment. Recent weeks have added nothing to the meager assortment of legislation sent over from the Commons for its consideration.
