

JUBILEE HOSPITAL.

Election of President and Directors Proposed Establishment of a Maternity School.

Various Tenders to Be Advertised For—Reports—Medical Staff Appointments Confirmed.

The regular monthly meeting of the directors of the Jubilee hospital was held last evening at the office of Yates & Jay.

A communication was received from the city council announcing that Messrs. H. D. Helmcken, Charles Hayward, W. L. Crimp and W. J. Dwyer had been selected to represent them on the board of directors.

A letter was read from Dr. J. S. Helenek urging upon the board the necessity of erecting a maternity school which would enable the nurses to complete their education, and for which money was already in hand.

On motion it was decided to receive the communication for discussion at the next meeting. Immediately there arose an extended discussion which resulted in the directors deciding to refer the letter to a special committee who should confer with the medical staff as to the feasibility of the scheme.

The President appointed Messrs. Yates, Pemberton and Hayward as the committee. The report of the resident physician, Dr. Richardson, was received, containing detailed information concerning the hospital for the past month. The report was received and referred to the committee for the month.

The matron's report was also received. This report included a letter from the private secretary of Lady Aberdeen stating that she had forwarded to the hospital a copy of "Onward and Upward," which she hoped would prove of interest to the inmates. This was received and the donor heartily thanked.

The steward's report and the monthly report of the medical officer was received and filed. The secretary was instructed to call for the usual tenders for the necessary hospital supplies, including working and laundry up to June 30 1895, the tenders to be in by noon July 20.

Mr. Dwyer urged that the tenders be referred to white people and that "no Chinese need apply."

Mr. Yates did not believe in such action when applied to the spending of public funds, and thought the lowest tender should be accepted whether Chinese or white.

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A MODERN CARGO SHIP.

Steamship "Strathnevis" of the N.P. Line Arrives With a Very Heavy Freight.

A Derelict Sighted in the Pacific—Features of the Oriental Stranger.

The British ship Strathnevis, one of the three big steamers recently chartered by the Northern Pacific Steamship Company to increase their trans-Pacific service and the first to arrive here, tied up at the ocean dock on Sunday morning after having spent the night in the Straits.

The ship carried no passengers, but she was fully accommodated for any other than Chinese or Japanese passengers. She left Hongkong on the 4th June, and after four days' travel, Kobe on June 14, and Yokohama on the 19th, thence making her way here in a little over seventeen days.

The ship is 325 feet long, her breadth of beam is 43 feet, and her depth of hold 31 feet. She is 3,675 gross tonnage, her dead weight carrying capacity being 5,668 tons.
