FORMING A GOVERNMENT

Public notions are forming a new Government to-day. It is generally conceded that Col. Baxter will be called as Premier, and that he will take in addition the Chairmanship of the Hydro Commission. It is also expected that he will call Mr. Belly to the Attorney-Generalship, a gentleman who enjoys an honorable standing and a good reputation in the second largest city in the Province. Dr. Dougan of Harvey may be called to the portfolio of Public Health; Dr. Taylor, of Charlotte, an old-timer, to the Lands and Mines; Hon. B. Frank Smith to Public Works; and Louis Smith, of Albert, Minister of Agriculture—Gleaner.

CHICAGO AND CRIME

The decision by a Chicago jury that Russell Scott is insane saves another murderer from death. Cases which are becoming so numerous in the United States that they are engaging world interest, in a recent article on this "Great American Scandal" Richard Washburn Child pointed out that in 1921 Chicago had almost 3 cases of robbery with a gun per day and that 75 per cent of the cases brought to trial paid no penalty. Mr. Child continuing, said:

"In the first three months of the year 1923, there were reported 636 robberies at the point of a gun—seven a day. London's robbery cases ran between thirty and forty a year. In 1918 New York had two and a half times as many burglaries as London. Y. In 1915 New York had more burglaries than the whole of England and Wales. In 1919 when statistics were available, there were, says the American Bar Association report, only twenty-nine highway robberies in France. San Francisco had that year 258 highway robberies, Washington 323, Chicago, 1,862, Louisville 217, St. Louis 1087.

But France treats violence differently. Instead of letting off 90 out of 100 murderers, France convicted 108 of its 585 in the year 1919, and the same is true of robbery. I believe the sole reason for the difference between the mild crime record of France compared with our big carnival is the difference between the punishment and the indulgence of crime.

"In Chicago one newspaper constantly has pointed out that the police are busy with prohibition and gambling, neglecting public safety. I asked numbers of sophisticated citizens of Chicago if their homes were safe or if they would go home on foot after ten o'clock. The answer was vehemently in the negative. It was pointed out that gun deaths were three times those in New York and it would take a year's investigation to find out how many times the rate in New York exceeded that of London, Paris, Berlin or Rome.

What Boston is a city like Chicago in penalty whatever it is doing 1923 with 50 per cent of the failure to punish crime inevitably causes an increase in crime and leads to crime increase and the severity and more than 60 per cent of United States is causing grave all the felony cases in Chicago paid anxiety.

TO DUMP LIQUOR WORTH \$1,000,000

The Accumulation of Seized Liquor at Buffalo to Go in Lake.

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 12.—Liquor and paraphernalia for the brewing and distilling of illegal intoxicants, confiscated by dry agents of the Buffalo district the past four years, to the estimated value of more than \$1,000,000, will meet the fate next week of all such seizures, it was announced last night by Milton C. Strebel, assistant federal attorney. Strebel said he would apply to Federal Judge John Hazen for an order to destroy all the confiscated liquor and equipment now resting in the Government warehouse in Niagara street. It is the customary procedure, once the order is signed, for the marshal's office to consign the condemned intoxicants to the waters of the Lake, and to reduce the machinery for manufacturing liquor to junk. About \$28,000 worth of ale was dumped into the Lake last week.

The purpose of the general cleanup is to save warehouse charges. It costs the Government about \$2,500 a month for storage charges, as four floors of the warehouse are filled to the ceiling with cases of liquor, copper kettles, brass funnels and boxes of fake labels.

As it is found that many local residents are unfamiliar with the provisions of the present United States Immigration Act it is thought the following may be of interest to readers of your paper.

As under the present United States Immigration Act all immigrant applicants for admission to the United States require Consular visas, anyone from the Consular District contemplating entering the United States should apply to this Consulate for information regarding these requirements.

As in many cases it is found that residents of the United States who are visiting Canada have unintentionally failed to comply with the provisions of the United States Immigration Act at the time of original entry to that country it is considered advisable that anyone in doubt as to compliance with these provisions should apply to this consulate in order to prevent possible delay at or return from the border port of admission.
