Gladstone-Avenne Suit Lost.

Because the city has not graded and laid the extension it made to Gladstone-avenue in 1891, the same as the rest of the street, the court yesterday declared the assessment of \$32,000 for the extension illegal, and gave to Benjamin Petman and the other property-owners judgment in their suit against the city to this end with costs.
