The Food Situation

In summing up the present situation
in connection with the World's food
menace, a prominent writer recently
wrote the following terse item which
affords food for deep thought:
"Our prosperity in the final analysis
depends upon the people of Canada
having a surplus of income over
consumption. The theory of a re-
stricted output is a lie, and if followed
must inevitably result in poverty and
misery. Waste on luxuries must be
reduced. The country must produce,
and increase production to avoid
disaster."

A great deal has been said and
written in way of encouragement to
the country, to continue to grow the
largest crops ever grown in Canada in
food stuffs of all kinds. The Press has
opened its columns for this purpose,
and viewing the situation from a
national standpoint, it is felt that
too much encouragement cannot
be given to our farmers and producers
at this critical time.

All observers of the labor situation
seem to agree on this point that for
obvious reasons employees of labor
are holding back in all lines of
labor activities. The inevitable
outcome must be that the production
of food stuffs the world over will
suffer as a result.

It is, therefore, not logical, neither
is it reasonable, to say that there will
be a food shortage during the present
year, in view of the unsettled labor
situation. A year ago there was a
shortage of fertilizer. This year the
supply is equal to the demand. The
best authorities on potato planting
advise that in this province,
the best time for planting
potatoes is between June 1st and 15th.
There is therefore nearly three
weeks within which planting can be
done.

Officials in a position to know, advise
us that they have every reason for
believing that transportation, which
in the past years has been lacking, will
be available this coming season to take
care of the Country's export trade.

Compulsory Attendance at School

School Sections hold their Annual
Meeting, Monday, June 20. At this
meeting every school section must
take a vote on the Compulsory
Attendance Act of 1918.

The old Compulsory Attendance Act
for various reasons was found in-
adequate and in 1918 it was repealed
and the same Compulsory Attendance
Act that applies to all incorporated
towns may be put in force in any
country section. This Act requires
that every child from six to sixteen
years of age shall attend school un-
less, they are twelve years of age
and past Grade VII; or having passed
thirteen years of age, necessity
compels them to go to work. In
these two cases the school
trustees can grant the child a
certificate permitting him to
be absent from school. For other
good and sufficient reasons a child
may be excused from attending school
such as sickness, or domestic afflic-
tion.

The Act provides that the parent or
person having control of a child
shall cause such child to attend
school. On failure to comply such
parent or person becomes liable to a
penalty not exceeding twenty
dollars, or one month imprisonment.
There is nothing drastic in the Act.
It fully meets the needs of the country
districts.

Will Have to Work at Their Old Pay

It is understood that the
matter of the proposed increased
seasonal indemnity for members of
Commons and Senate was referred to
in the Government caucus at Ottawa
and that it was officially intimated
by ministers in attendance that
the Government was not disposed to
sanction any change in the
indemnity at present. The proposed
increase was from \$2,500 to \$4,000
per annum.

It is reported that the purchasers of
Clarke Bros property intend building
a large pulp mill at Victoria Bridge
near Bear River station. Mr. W. G.
Clark will be managing director of
the new company.
