N. S. TEMPERANCE ACT ACCUSES AND INSPECTOR'S REPORT

To the Warden and Councilors of the Municipality of Annapolis County: Gentlemen—Permit me to submit the following report of my doings as your Inspector for enforcing the N. S. Temperance Act during the year 1922:

In March last I proceeded against Andrew Smith, of West Dalhousie, secured a conviction before Stipendiary McKay, and committed Smith to prison.

I made the following searches without the expense of securing warrants: the premises of Arthur Sims and Ezekiel Marsman at Ingleswood, Jas. Morrison near the town of Middleton, Harry Gesner near Parker's Cove, Moses' and six other premises at General Bridge, Lequile. I also visited Clementsport with the intention of searching premises near Waldeck line, but upon consultation with Conciliator Rawding and others, it was concluded that the search was not necessary. I also made a trip to Springfield for purpose of search but could not secure evidence of any value.

At Sims, Marsman's and Morrison's I found supplies of "Home Brew", but only small quantities in the other localities. In the Sims case I brought action in May last, secured a conviction and had a warrant of commitment issued, but on his premises to refrain from selling or otherwise disposing of such Beer, I have simply held the warrant over him ready for use at any time. In August last I again visited his residence and found nothing objectionable, and am convinced that the said conviction has been sufficient to put him out of the business.

In the case of Marsman and Morrison I could not procure sufficient evidence to warrant my bringing action. In fact, no action has been brought by me unsuccessfully. Tereto annexed is my general account totalling \$100.36 with itemized accounts appended thereto.
