THE GREAT DONCASTER ST. LEGER.

London, Sept. 18.

The Centennial race for the St. Leger attracted an enormous crowd at Doucaster to-The weather was scarcely favorable. day. The weather was scarcely invorable. Nine horses went the post, of which Kisber was the favorite, 2 to 1 being freely bet against him. Petrarch was second favorite; st first 8 to 1 was bet against him, but just at the start 5 to 1 was freely laid, while against all the others from 20 to 25 to 1 was forthcoming.

Risber took the lead soon after the start and held it a good pace to the distance, when he "went all to pieces," and was passed by Petrarch and Wild Tommy. A desperato race between them ensued, which resulted in the success of Petrarch by a neck, Wild Tommy second, and Julius Casar third. The race was run in 8:191. The following are the conditions.

THE WINNER-PETRARCH.

For "in-and-out" running Petrarch will certainly carry off the palm this year, for, whether the coli was "fixed " to lose the Derby or not, he has certainly showed equal to the best of the year. There can be no disguise that he was over-estimated last Winter, when, on the strength of a single performance in winning the Middle Park Plate from a field of twenty-nine, he was at once installed the favorite for the I'wo Thousand and Derby. When he won the Middle Park Plate he was owned by a Mr. Spencer. Early in the Spring he was purchased by a ricing confederacy, of which Lord Dupplin is the acknowledged head, at a price said to have been 1,000, since which time the colt has been more or less under the suspicion. not so much from his own faults, although be has suspicious hocks, but from the charactor of these who central him. For the Two Thousand Guineas he was so well worked that his stable companion, Kaleidoscope, started the tavorite at 8 to 1 against him, while 20 to 1 was laid against Petrarch. bad were these two performances that many tion, the result of which was that the bad performances of the colt was attributed to the act that he was not an everyday horse, and, as he showed lame the week following. it was that, although looking well, he had suffered either from disordered feet or knees. Certainly he was given a long rest, and it was not until the end of July or early in August that Mr. John Dawson again put him to stiff work for the St. Leger. He took all his work woll, and at last mail advaces (Aug. 81), 5 to 4 was being bet on Kisber, while 5 to 1 was laid against Petrarch, 1,000 to 85 against Julius Cæsar, and 50 to 1 against Great Tom. That Kisber had gone back in the betting from some cause is certain, but that Petrarch should have turned up good enough to beat him is still more surprising. Petrarch's success, however, again brings the Lord Clitden's to the front, the son of Newmin ter having won the race himself, in 1868, from a field of nincteen. Newminster himself winning in 1851, his sire, Touchstone, by Camel, winning in 1884.

Petrarch was brod by a Mr. Gosdon, who gave only £25 for Laura, the dam of Petrarch, she having been the dam of such horses as Lemnos, Fraulein, Ashfield, Protomartyr and Rotherhill. To look at Petrarch, he is a bay with a narrow blaza- on his face. He stands very nearly sixteen hands, and is a colt of great bone and symmetry. His forelegs are well formed, although he has been blistered more than once. He has a strong back, fine shoulders and plonty of length. His only remaining engagement is for the Select Stakes, to be run at Newmarket during the second October meeting, over the Rowley mile, when, if a starter, he will have to carry 182 lbs., with Kisber in the race at the same weights, and Julius Cæsar at 122 lbs.

SHOOTING AT GUELPH.

The annual pigeon shooting match be-

tween the Town vs. Country was shot on Mr. Balkwill's meadow, on the 14th inst. There were fifteen gentlemen on each side, Mr. T. Holliday being captain of the town team, and Mr. J. Hewer of the country one. The country team shot 70 birds, and the town shots only scored 56. From this it will be seen that neither side killed half the birds allotted to them. Mr. John West led the score for the town by shooting nine birds, and Messrs. Martin & Duffield with seven for the country. Pallister acted as scorer, and Mr. Heming, of Paris, as umpire, both discharging their duties to the satisfaction of the "Sons of Nimrod."
