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TREATMENT OF CERTAIN GASTRIC AFFECTIONS.—From a recent article

of Dujardin-Beaumetz (*Bulletin General de Therapeutique*) and quoted from *The Therapeutic Gazette*, we cull the following: Every individual suffering from disease of the stomach in whom there exists a true arrest of gastric function, or a tendency to such a condition, should on going to bed lie on the right side, in order to facilitate the passage of the food into the duodenum. Lying on the left side gives rise to the formation of a large amount of gas, accompanied by a regurgitation into the œsophagus of the products of digestion. Patients should make use of warm drinks. The usefulness of these is evident; in fact, warm water is one of the best means to excite muscular contractions in the stomach, but it is liable to cause vomiting. It is therefore pref-

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
