Mr. Chairman,

At the very moment when this conmittee has at last arrived at what can only be described as a very significant achievement in adopting the implementation article of the Genvention before us, the Convention seems to us to be jeopardised by a last minute additional article, that is to say article XIII (bds).

Hr. Chairman, it is almost trite, but so loss important, to remind ourselves of the fact that what we have achieved thus far has been the result of the spirit of cooperation and compressive which has thus far provailed in this coundties. Indeed, sir, as you yourstill pointed out yesterday, despite the very frank exchange of viewpoints, often seemingly irreconcilable, we have managed to adopt the article of this Convention without a negative vote being east. Yet, from thes exchanges that have taken place both late yesterday and here this afternoon it seems clear that if the Article XIXI (bis) as presented by the UAR, Tansania and Suchn in document 1307 is present to the vote the recent that we have established, will be broken by a significant number of countries weing against the article.

It is my duty, sir, to inform the committee that Samada will be amongst those countries that will be forced entegorically to declare itself opposed to the inclusion of Article XIII (bis) as contained in document 1307 in the Convention. Although this stand will be open to misinterpretation because of the obvious principle which appears to be affirmed by this Article, we do not feel that we have to excuse our position in the light of what so many delegations have said before us. Suffice it to say, Mr. Chairman, that when the distinguished representative of Ghana, the representative of a country which no one here could possibily doubt stands in the forefront of
