REQUEST FOR STATEMENT ON REASONS FOR INVOKING WAR MEASURES ACT

Mr. Lincoln M. Alexander (Hamilton West): Mr. Speaker, I wish to direct a question to the Prime Minister. In view of the fact it is alleged that the Secretary of State is now questioning the credibility of the government in dealing with the Quebec situation, and also the invocation of the War Measures Act, will the Prime Minister now take this matter into consideration and report to the House tomorrow in order that we can understand and be apprised of the attitude of the government in this whole matter?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): The hon. member's question is based on an earlier question of his leader, which was apparently based on a press report that was false. Therefore the whole premise of this question falls to the ground. I suggest that some members read the book.

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. The question period has expired. I have taken note of hon. members who have exercised patience. I did the same yesterday. I think I have been true to my word and have given preference to hon. members who did not have an opportunity to ask their questions yesterday. The Chair will follow the same practice tomorrow.
