Question No. 2,819-Mr. Howard:

1. Is there any prohibition either direct or by implication that Canadian Armed Forces personnel stationed at Masset, British Columbia are not to become players on any softball teams other than one which may be organized for armed forces personnel and, if so, does this prohibition apply to any softball team which may be organized among native Indian people?

2. If such a prohibition does exist, by whose order or authority was that decison made and is, or has that person been asked or directed to alter the prohibition so there can be free association among the various people in the area?

Hon. James Richardson (Minister of National Defence): 1. No. in the past few years a number of servicemen have participated as players on local community teams including teams organized by native Indian people. In 1973 CFS Masset organized a second softball team and this may have contributed to the lack of participation of Canadian Forces personnel on other community softball teams. One serviceman is however currently playing as a member of the locally organized Haida basketball team.
