

WILL NOT ANNEX PROPERTY IN PART

Board of Control Announces
Decision Respecting Hum-
ber Valley Territory.

TO ABOLISH CORONERS

Controller O'Neill Has Little
Faith in Inquests, But Board
Takes No Action.

Annexation of a portion of the Hum-
ber valley territory, was not favored
by the board of control yesterday.
Home Smith had asked that the ter-
ritory west from the city limits to the
west brow of the valley, all south of
Dundas street, be forthwith taken into
the city.

There is an agreement between
Home Smith and the city that the ter-
ritory as far west as Church street
be annexed as soon as the necessary
petition is signed. The board decided
that this territory must come in as a
whole, and not in portions.

A special meeting of the city coun-
cil will be held tomorrow afternoon
at 4 o'clock to discuss the tenders for
the extension of the filtration plant.

It was agreed to deal on Friday with
the reorganization of the fire and city
architect's department and the estab-
lishing of a purchasing department.

Acting City Architect Price is to be
invited in the meantime to present his
defence to the criticisms in Judge
Denton's findings from the investiga-
tion of the architect's department.

"Atlanta is saving \$10,000 a month by
having a purchasing department,"
Mayor Hocken stated.

The construction of the sewer thru
Small's Pond is completed and Dr.
Hastings, M.O.H., has notified the
property owners around the pond that
they must abate the nuisance from the
breaking of the dam. The board will
try to get the contractor to restore
the break in the dam.

Ald. Wickert's motion to apply for
a city charter was referred to the legal
department to report upon the ad-
vantages or disadvantages.

The council will be asked to send to
the provincial government a recom-
mendation that Superintendent Find-
lay be appointed in charge of the wom-
en's industrial farm.

Abolish Coroners.
Controller O'Neill suggested that
coroners be abolished and inquests be
held before a commission, claiming
that coroners' inquests do not go
deeply enough to show what preven-
tive measures are necessary. No ac-
tion was taken.

Mayor Hocken stated that he had
read in a morning paper that the
property committee had instructed the
city architect to issue a permit under
the old bylaw for the reconstruction
of a building for hotel purposes. The
building is on the south side of Ad-
elaide street, east of Yonge street.

The mayor said that the property com-
mittee has not the power to order
the issuance of a permit.

"The committee did not give such an
order to the architect," Controller
O'Neill explained.

Acting City Architect Price was
sent for and he said he was not clear
as to why there was objection to the
permit, but he understood the fire
escapes would project over lanes, and
Commissioner Harris would not have
them to be so placed.

"Don't do anything until you have
consulted with the board," Mayor
Hocken said to Mr. Price.

Major Collins asked for a grant of
\$1500 for the restoration of old fort
buildings. He said that the old bar-
racks are tumbling down and the amount
will probably be granted.

ENCOURAGE BIRDS TO TRILL IN PARKS

Efforts Will Be Made to In-
duce Migratory Songsters
to Locate Here.

Encouragement of song birds to the
parks and private gardens was the
subject at the meeting of the parks
and exhibition committee yesterday. In
a lengthy address C. W. Nash, pro-
fessor of natural history, gave much valuable
information.

He explained that the flight of migra-
tory birds is along the lake shore and
up the Humber and Don valleys. He
said that by placing bird houses in the
parks and private grounds, the birds
would be attracted there and would
likely remain thruout the season.

"Every bird will eat its own weight
in insects in a day," he stated. "And
they are specialists in the matter of
insects in the soil that do much dam-
age to plant life."

Commissioner Chambers stated that
fifty bird houses are now provided for
the parks and that one hundred for
private more are being built by train-
ing. He said he would consult with
Mr. Nash as to the placing of the houses.

Rev. R. N. Burns, representing the
soft clubs in the city, asked for the
establishment of civic golf links so
that all classes of men would have an
opportunity to play the game. His
said a course could be laid out in High
Park that would not interfere with other
recreations, and that the expense
would be small. The matter was re-
ferred to Commissioner Chambers, who
will report.

An offer of the free use of Dufferin
Park for baseball purposes was ac-
cepted.

Seventy-two hand cones are to be
given in the parks this summer.
