WESTON COMMISSION

Estimates Received for Cluster Lights and Sewer Laterals.

Permission was granted last night by the Weston Water, Power and Light Commission to J. Ralston to connect to the water service on St. John's road for the supply necessary in the erection of a building to cost \$45.000, but the basement is the only portion to be erected at the present time, and will involve and expenditure of \$18,000. Macfariane on Waverley road, and later in the home of Mr. T. S. Lobbs and in the fire hall.
