## LEAFS LOOK GOOD EXCEPT PITCHERS

Clymer Boys Keep Up Ter-  
rific Slugging Against Col-  
lege Team at Durham.

DURHAM, N.C., April 16.—The Toronto ball team celebrated its return home this afternoon by handing Trinity College a severe thrashing, 15 to 2. As in the Greensboro games, the feature was the terrific slugging of Clymer's men. They piled up sixteen hits, including six doubles and a triple off four pitchers, all right handed. They have battered the ball in the three games this week. Toronto has scored thirty-five runs on forty-four hits, thirty of them doubles, and five triples. That is numerous slugging.

The pitching was not, of course, of Class A.A. calibre, but it was by boys in condition ready for their opening. In fact Durham, in the same league as Greensboro, beat Dunn's Richmond team yesterday, 1 to 0, and today, 8 to 2. And it is Richmond that Toronto faces first. As in the games in Greensboro, the team performed admirably in the field, and the hitting speaks for itself. They are fast on the bases, Brackett, Brown, Hollander and Sheehan going down very speedily.

Hollander seems to have thied base and has made good in all depart-ments. Graham improves daily in right field, and Brown is going very strong at bat, on bases and in the field. So much so that it is more than possible he may be purchased if the price is lowered sufficiently. The pitching to date leaves much to be desired. The heavens are not nearly as far advanced as the rest of the team. There is no telling what the present squad may be able to do when the time comes. Herbert has shown unmistakable signs of a great year, and McGee needs control only, but the rest have shown little. Geyer pitched five innings today and was touched up quite freely for five hits and five passes. He lacks speed, but had a nice curve. And went thru the last four with one hit, two passes and a hit by pitcher off him. Toronto plays games with Durham Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. The score:
