HER MAJESTY TO CARE FOR CHILD SURVIVOR

Queen Alexandra Requests Information About Orphan Girl Saved by Cowper.

LONDON, June 11.—The action of Ernest Cowper, a Toronto newspaperman, in rescuing a child passenger on the Lusitania, named Helen Smith, has appealed so much to Queen Alexandra that she has sent to the Cunard Company at Liverpool a request for particulars.

Mr. Cowper put the child, who is six years of age and extraordinarily intelligent, into one of the lifeboats after the ship was torpedoed. After being in the water for an hour and a quarter, Mr. Cowper managed to get into the boat, and by a curious coincidence the first one to greet him aboard was the little girl, who said: "There's the gentleman who got me."

Helen Smith, thru the disaster, has been left alone in the world, and the interest of the queen mother is typical of her kindness of heart. Many offers to adopt the little survivor have been received.

REV. R. J. TRELEAVEN IS NEW PRESIDENT

Well Known Minister Appointed Head of Toronto Methodist Conference.

KING ALCOHOL TO WIN

Should Germany Be Victorious, Said Rev. Dr. Chown, Condemning Liquor.

Rev. R. J. Treleven was elected president at the opening session of the Toronto Methodist Conference at Elm Street Church yesterday morning.

Rev. Dr. Chown, general superintendent of the Methodist Church, gave an address in which he condemned the liquor traffic in strong terms, and declared that the Methodists were out to annihilate the liquor trade and nothing else would do. If the British Empire were defeated it would not be by the Kaiser but by King Alcohol.

Sympathy, Dr. Chown declared, was the keynote of British policy. Bearing another's burdens was the lesson the British Empire teaches. He commended to the Methodists the use of the example of the Englishman, who, when he heard that the Germans were making brooches engraved, "God Punish England," made one inscribed, "God Forgive Germany."

At the afternoon session Rev. A. N. St. John of Bolton was elected secretary.

Superannuation was granted to Rev. V. H. Emory, C. J. Dobson, W. A. Rodwell, T. Legate, N. Wellwood, J. W. Wilkinson and R. McKee.

Rev. Dr. Briggs aroused enthusiasm by expressing the opinion that the ones could appropriately during the present stirring times use the verse of the National Anthem which contains the words, "Confound their politics and all their knavish tricks," or the term, "navy tricks" could be used.

A book report, presented by Rev. Dr. Briggs, showed that despite the war the year's business was within ten per cent. of last year, which was the record year of the book room. The total business of the year amounted to half a million dollars. The sum of \$23,000 was set aside for superannuation fund, making a total of \$381,000 given to that fund by the book room.

Spraying the Roses

By keeping watch over my own roses I notice that rose bush spraying should be attended to at once. The last few days' temperature made conditions very suitable for the growth and development of that great pest among rose bushes—namely, the aphids.

This small fly can do quite as much mischief to the bushes and to the buds of the wickedest green worms can. The young flies gathered in countless numbers and living on the under sides of the tender young leaves, suck the life juices from the leaves, turning them yellow, crinkled and spotted with brown. Soon the leaf dies, or if it does not die, but still clings to the bush, is very unsightly and unhealthy looking.

Leaves that have once been subjected to the depredations of these pestiferous again regain their healthy appearance.

The best remedy for the aphids is the ordinary garden hose used as a fine spray morning, noon and night. The flies cannot stand the constant washing off of the leaves by this steady, strong spray. A hose spray is all that is necessary for the very greatest part of these flies, and has the advantage that never by any means, as many of the common insecticides do, when used too often or too strong.

For the fat, green, small coiled-up worm that will be very common in a week or ten days, the fine hose spray is not always efficacious, unless used before the worms become too numerous.
