Let our study of it most thorough and searching. Let us bring to ear upon it every literary and grammatical help. But bove all, we need the guidance and enlightenment of e Holy Spirit; for, as Dr. Robertson Nicholl has mphatically said: "The Word of God cannot be nderstood by those who have no spiritual fellowship ith the writers." "Nothing is understood in the us great ew Testament (or in the Old) without direct spiritual umination."
