DENIED HE THREATENED TO SWITCH THE VOTE

Merely Told Alderman He Would Try to Prevent His Election—Stole the Table Furnishings.

HAMILTON, Nov. 15.—(Special.)—In Zion Tabernacle to-night, Rev. A. H. Goings, the pastor, made a public denial that he had threatened Ald. Forth with the loss of the temperance vote because of the remarks made by him at the council meeting last night about Rev. A. J. McCombs, a Toronto evangelist. The report that Rev. Mr. Goings had made such a threat, was contained in The Spectator to-night, and the clergyman said that it was foolish to suppose that he would make such a threat, as he had no power to switch the temperance vote. He said he would withdraw his own support and would do what he could to prevent his election.

Boulevard Will Run Too Close—Park Commission Contends Land Value Will Increase.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—The findings of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board, now hearing the expropriation proceedings instituted by the Queen Victoria Park Commission against farmers living along the river between here and Bridgeburg, to secure land for constructing a frontier boulevard, will not be known till next week, when they will be announced in Toronto.

Jas. Pearson, Ewart Farquhar and Some Davenport Road Ratepayers Relate Some Experiences.

The enquiry into the civic works department was begun in earnest yesterday with the holding of an all-day session by Judge Winchester. The chief witnesses were James Pearson, president of the Construction and Paving Company, and ex-Ald. Ewart Farquhar, whose charges against the department have been frequently aired in the past. Mr. Pearson's main contentions were that it was unfair to subject other companies to the competition of a public utility company with a patented material, and that the day labor system discriminated unjustly against asphalt contractors.


