WAS CITY NEGLECTED INSPECTION OF INTAKE?

Controllers Order Report From Mr. Rust—Would Investigate Charges Against L.S. Levee.

The conduct of the waterworks department came in for a brief discussion at the meeting of the board of control yesterday. It was introduced by Controller Hocken in the following motion:

"That the city engineer be instructed to report to this board forthwith how many times the intake pipe extending into the lake from the island shore has been examined since it was laid; and that he include a copy of the records kept, if any."

The fact that the management committee of the board of education had decided against a hearing by the county judge of the Levee charges caused the request for an investigation to be laid over until to-morrow morning. There is every possibility that the investigation will be recommended then regardless of the action of the board of education to-night. The mayor and Controller Church and Spencer are of the opinion that the investigation should be proceeded with. The mayor, in fact, was very pointed in his remarks to the delay in sending the recommendation on. He was of the opinion that enough had already been made public to warrant an investigation.

When the report of the civic works committee came up Controller Church made some enquiries as to the delay of the board of education in building the technical school.

The matter was not officially before the board, however, no action could be taken on it.

Controller Church introduced a resolution to petition the provincial government to permit all cities over 100,000 population to give their municipal councils power to regulate and control the estimates and expenditures of the board of education as to capital account, money by-laws and repair expenditures over \$500.

The resolution did not meet with the unanimous approval of the board, although the mayor said that he favored something being done to make the trustees directly responsible to the electors for their handling of the educational fund. He criticized last year's board for the apparently loose manner in which increases to salaries had been made.

Controller Spencer favored collecting the school tax by a separate bill.

It was finally decided to refer the matter to the legislation and reception committee.

The board favored the application of the new woman's building at the Industrial Exhibition grounds to Wick-ott's Bros., the price named being \$58,978. The cost as estimated by Manager Orr was \$67,000.

The board exonerated J. Schoales, a health inspector, who was charged with assaulting Mrs. Barger of Wallace-avenue, while inspecting the premises.

SUGGESTS FREE WARDS FOR ISOLATION HOSPITAL

Local Board of Health to Consider M. H. O. Proposal—February Health Record.

A proposal of Dr. Hastings, M.H.O., to make the wards at the isolation hospital free was favorably received.

Miss Neilson reported the number of visits to patients' homes in February to be 168, with 40 business visits. Two patients were removed to the Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives, and one to the General Hospital. There were 8 homes disinfected and 10 patients supplied with a quantity of clothing daily. In attendance at the outdoor clinics at the General Hospital were 18 new patients and 49 old cases.

The city solicitor reported against the payment of a claim of \$600 to James Mitchell arising out of an alleged case of cross-infection at the isolation hospital. The claim was referred to the city solicitor and the medical health officer for an adjustment.

Instead of the medical health officer presenting a report on the isolation hospital it was decided that the entire board should visit the institution. They will make the visit to-morrow.

NORTH YORK LIBERALS

T. C. Robinette in Line for Federal Nomination in June.

North York Liberals will hold a convention in June to nominate a candidate to succeed the minister of justice, who will retire at the close of the session. T. C. Robinette appears likely to secure the nomination, which, it is believed, will carry with it a cabinet position if North York continues in the federal Liberal column.

That Hon. Mr. Acheson would not stand for re-election to parliament has been known for some months, and he has now formally stated his intention to the executive of the North York Liberal Association.

MITCHELL RESIGNS MEMBERSHIP

NEW YORK, March 1.—John Mitchell, former head of the United Mine Workers of America, and lately chairman of the trades agreement department of the National Civic Federation, to-day made public his resignation of his office and membership in the latter organization. Mr. Mitchell follows the same recently taken by the United Mine Workers of America in declaring that any member of their order accepting a position with the National Civic Federation would forfeit membership in the union.

CITY RELIEF IN FEBRUARY

City Relief Officer Coyell states that in February his department looked after 288 applicants for relief, most of whom sought admission to the hospitals or charitable institutions. Of these 64 were found unworthy of assistance and the others had their wants attended to. There were 125 orders for groceries issued thru the medical health office to quarantined houses.

Owing to the generous response to the request of Mr. Coyell for contributions of clothing fully 30 families have been supplied with clothing and a number of individual cases were also attended to.

ROBIN PLEADS GUILTY

NEW YORK, March 1.—Joseph G. Robin, banker, pleaded guilty to-day to larceny of \$27,000 from the Washington Savings Bank, of which he was president. He will be sentenced on March 27.

Seven other indictments remain. Thru his operations the Washington Savings Bank, the Northern Bank of New York, the Carnegie Trust Company and a string of minor concerns which he promoted, went into insolvency.

U. S. NAVAL APPROPRIATION.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—The naval appropriation bill was reported to the senate to-day. The naval program as drafted included two first-class battleships with a submarine tender and two gunboats. The bill appropriates \$128,400,828, an increase of \$1,190,700 over the amount fixed by the house.

Under an amendment adopted to-day the 3-hour law will apply only to the construction of the battleships. An unsuccessful effort was made to have it extend to the entire construction program.

Maine's Vote on Prohibition.

AUGUSTA, Me., March 1.—Re-submission to the vote of the people of Maine of the amendment to the state constitution prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, now lacks only the signature of the governor before being put into effect. The matter will then come before the people at a special election to be held next September.
