The success attending co-operation in Denmark and the keener competition of Danish agricultural and other products thus engendered, has compelled British farmers to adopt the system for the purpose of eliminating the middleman and securing that the benefit of high prices shall accrue directly to the members. In the end of last March there was opened at Elmswell, Suffolk, the first farmers' co-operative bacon curing first farmers co-operative bacon curing factory, an enterprise which may be the first step towards a revolution in British agricultural methods and the beginning of a great development. As described in a recent report of the Do-minion Department of Trade and Commerce, the building is 240 feet long, stands upon six acres and is considered the finest model bacon factory in the British Empire.
