INDICT JOHNSON ON FOUR COUNTS

Negro Pugilist, Charged With Transportation of Women for Immoral Purposes, Released on Bail.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—(Can. Press).—Jack Johnson, champion negro pugilist, was indicted by the federal grand jury today, charged with violation of the Mann Act against the transportation of women from one state to another for immoral purposes. Johnson was indicted on four counts and his bail fixed at \$20,000 by United States Judge Landis.

Federal officers were instructed to arrest Johnson, who could not be found

early this morning. The search for him extended to various quarters of the city.

The specific case upon which the indictment against Johnson was based was that of Belle Schreiber of Pittsburgh (white), whom Johnson was charged with bringing to Chicago in August, 1910.

The jury, however, heard the testimony of Lucille Cameron of Minnesota, whose mother charged Johnson with abduction, and she was held as a witness in \$15,000 bail.

SOHIER ACQUITTED IN FRANCE.

LILLE, France, Nov. 7.—(Can. Press).—Emil Sohler, former mayor of Hopplingen, in the department of Nord, who recently returned to France from Detroit, Mich., to face a charge of embezzlement, was acquitted here today and discharged from custody.

President Fallieres signed a decree in March last removing Mayor Sohler, the alleged embezzlement of the town's funds being given as the grounds for the dismissal.

Not Rowdies, Say Hamilton Tigers

Will Not Play Alerts Until Changes That Tigers Would Try to Disable Alerts' Best Players Are Retracted.

HAMILTON, Nov. 7.—The latest regarding the proposed game between the Tigers and Alerts for the city championship is that the directors of the Tigers will not consent to the game unless certain statements alleged to have been made by a member of the Alerts executive regarding the Tigers are retracted. Anti-Freezing Mixture

"These cool nights and nippy mornings ought to make the car owner think of his cooling system and how to keep it from freezing up. If he intends using his car during the winter," says a member of the Jackson forces.

"It is well to put a good anti-freeze solution into the radiator in good time. It should be remembered that the water in the cooling system, particularly in the cylinder jackets and the pump, and in some types of radiator, lies in thin sheets. This it freezes more readily than a larger bulk of water would. So the anti-freeze solution should not be neglected too long.

"It isn't much of a trick to prepare the cooling system for the winter. Of course, it must be thoroughly drained, and it is a good idea to flush it out, while the radiator drain cocks are open. This can be done by inserting a hose in the radiator filler stem and turning the water on. It will be really surprising to see the rusty red color of the water that gushes forth, carrying sediment with it.

"When the water system has been cleaned, refill it with a solution composed of two parts of alcohol, either denatured or wood, and one part water. This will not freeze, even at 30 degrees below zero. But it must be remembered that alcohol evaporates, and that on refilling the radiator every few days, equal parts of alcohol and water should be used. If glycerine is mixed with the alcohol, the cold-resisting properties of the solution remain the same, and new glycerine need not be added because the glycerine does not evaporate. But don't forget to add fresh alcohol. This is more expensive than plain water, to be sure, but it is an economy compared with the cost of replacing a cylinder or repairing a radiator that has been burst by freezing."
