

Investment Proves Necessity of Company Securing Control

Montreal, Oct. 24.—(Special.)—At the afternoon session of the insurance commission yesterday, the enquiry by Dominion Counsel Shepley passed from investments of the Sun Life in Illinois to those in similar traction companies in the State of Ohio. In Illinois the company made great gains from investments in interurban electric railway bonds, but in Ohio the case was reversed.

T. B. Macaulay, secretary of the Sun Life, attributed the losses to mismanagement of the Ohio chain by Appleyard, who controlled the system. The so-called "Appleyard System" of railways was one beginning at Dayton, Ohio, and running to Springfield and Columbus. The Sun Life bought securities from Appleyard on the understanding that he should take them back at an increase. It was really a loan to Appleyard, When the time of repurchase came, Appleyard had not funds and so owed the company \$589,000. To repay this he sold the Sun Life large blocks of bonds and stocks. Later these deteriorated in value and the company had to write almost all of them off the books. Now values have gone up again, but the company will lose the interest.


