As for the respective platforms of the two contestants there is much in what Allan Studholme stands for to arouse enthusiasm, while Mr. Scott's is more compromising. Studholme is an uncompromising advocate of state ownership of public utilities, while there are few who care for that. The latter has said that he was sorry that public ownership has proved to be a success in Glasgow, for the other side have bogged the example to their loss. The World asked him to define his platform, and he declined. He said he was realistic to his aims and refused to grant an interview to clarify the atmosphere.

There are many points of dissimilarity between the two candidates. Stud helme is a rapid-fire talker and volunteers all kinds of information. Scott is not a talker. He is a listener. On the other hand, J. J. Scott, K. C. is handsome, well dressed, and well educated. He has the evidence of unstinted prosperity. He has become enriched thru land speculations. He derives considerable revenue from real estate. He has been a member of the east end; he has served professionally some of the big corporations and he brought about a brewery merger that has so added to his popularity.

Behind Mr. Scott is a splendid organization, while his opponent has no organization. On the other hand, he has his collaborators. The one best bet that he will be elected by a good majority, but even this kind of support is not so sure as the MAYOR's support.
