

SECOND DAY OF FALL RACES

New Track Record for Woodbine Park.

RAN 1 1/4 MILES IN 2.09 3/4

This Time Three Favorites Finished in Front.

Very Step 12 to 1 shot, landed the mile race in slow time—Marion 3 to 1, Ab Fashion 4 to 1, Bannock 3 to 1, Thornecliffe 4 to 5 and Dumbarton 5 to 1. Money won the other races—Fine Weather, Fast Track.

Three favorites, second and third choices and a long shot landed the money on the second day of the Hunt Club fall races. The weather was clear and cool, the track fast and the attendance about 2000.

The racing was of a superior order, the fields large, except in the Jockey Club Stakes, and the finishes in two instances of the heart-breaking order.

There were practically only two contenders in the three-horse race, the Jockey Club Stakes, and so fierce was the battle between the pair that a new record for the Woodbine track was established—2.09 3/4 for the mile and a quarter, beating Bannock's mark by just a quarter of a second.

The same 12 books drew in, and they had again all the business they could attend to. The takers of odds were beaten a second time, although three first choices did manage to finish in front.

Takanassie started favorite for the first race, being strongly supported and backed from 5 to 2 down to 7 to 6. Marston was played by the talent for first and second, as was South Africa, by the London contingent. Marston was ridden judiciously and came easily when Coyle let out a wrap. The others were pretty well strung out at the finish.

Adam Beck turned loose the best thing of the day in the second race, John Lark's Kinky started a hot favorite over the big field, but seemed to sink early in the journey. Sanger rode a splendid race across the board, and just managed to stay long enough to beat the favorite.

The well-bred and handsome defender, Thornecliffe, showed a fine style of work and tired coming home. De-fender and Lark were strongly backed across the board, and down on the Stray Step, including Mr. Beck, who got as good as 15 to 1 to 10 to 1.

John Brennan's Mongolian was the choice of the public for first and second, and was managed to get into the money. It was a race between Flying Blue and Ab Fashion, the latter going well without a whip, while James applied the lash vigorously, but the 4 to 1 favorite played a good game, both pretty well pumped. Besides the trio inside the money, the Devil had many supporters, especially for place and to show. Mongolian tried badly at the finish.

Bannock won the fourth race through the superior horsemanship of Sanger, the Toronto jockey. Graham Anderson's good 3-year-old was the choice of the crowd, but had merely a runner's place, losing to Bennington and Gardiner's Mazarine. The two raced together all the way, but the favorite never more than a half-length ahead. They finished all right, but the 4 to 1 favorite was not a good one.

W. F. Dunne's Thornecliffe showed great quality in the fifth race, and winning the long stretch galloping. Price looked dangerous through the field, but quit on the last lap, and the land ran well until he tumbled. Max and Laddie made a race of it, and the public got back something on Thornecliffe's victory. The other four were more or less supported for second and third places.

The victory in the last race was one of the most popular of the day. Handicap, Dumbarton capturing the purse from a good field easily. The Hamilton contingent backed their choice heavily, forcing his price from 2 to 1 to even, and making the believers getting the strongest support of the day. Walker took his mount to the front yard ready. Gov. Sheehan was punished, but could only finish a neck and two lengths of the winner. Cheatham had a few supporters, who showed misplaced confidence.

DROWNING OF YOUNG ROHR.

Particulars of the Loss of the Buffalo

Particulars of the Drowning of Leo M. Rohr of Buffalo, in the Severn River at Flat Rapids, last Friday, are furnished from Severn Bridge to-day as follows:

A camping party, consisting of Dr. Max Breuer, Edward L. Davis, Leo M. Rohr and a guide, were camping at Flat Rapids, and while out traveling in a canoe the bow of the canoe, which contained L. M. Davis and Leo M. Rohr, was caught in the current and overturned. Rohr, who could not swim, was drawn under immediately, while Davis, who is a powerful swimmer, was swept down the river one hundred yards in spite of all his efforts, to the second wharf, where it required all his strength to keep him from being sucked down. Dr. Max Breuer and guide helped Mr. Davis, who was in an exhausted condition, to get Mr. Rohr out of the water. Mr. Davis started next morning for Severn Bridge to secure help to search for the body of Rohr, but the search party was quickly organized, headed by Messrs. Menzel, Stein, Young and Cox and a number of Indians. They offered a reward of one hundred dollars to anyone finding the body. All day Saturday and Sunday the search went on without success. Mr. Davis secured the services of William Crawford of Toronto, a professional diver, who arrived in Severn on a special train at 4 a.m. Monday, the 27th, and though the search has been continued, the body has not yet been recovered.

The party is individually wealthy, and no expense will be spared to recover the body. Mr. Rohr was a very promising young man and highly respected by all who knew him in Buffalo. His father, Mathias Rohr, is manager of the Germania Life Insurance Co. of Buffalo, and is well known in business circles in Toronto. Mr. Frank Rohr, a brother of Leo, arrived here yesterday. The body of Rohr, which was found in the Severn, will be taken to Buffalo for interment.
