It has no ecclesiastical power or authority. It cannot alter the canons or affect the discipline of the church, but is simply intended to promote fellowship, interest and enthusiasm Four Places Suggested.

The Steps Taken to Weed Out the San Jose Scale From the Fruit Farms of Niagara.

And Those Interested Tell The World That Less Fruit Trees Will Be Better Anyway.

On Saturday last The World visited the fruit-growing district adjacent to the city of St. Catharines for the purpose of investigating the alleged ravages of the San Jose scale in that part of the Niagara Peninsula. Among the many prominent fruit growers and agriculturists interviewed are the following: Lieutenant R. W. Gregory, J. H. Broderick, M. Burrell, of the Township of

Grantham Township: Albert Pay, Lincoln Township.

R. W. Gregory stated that up to the present there had been none of the scale found in the Township of Louth, and commended the Government for the measures now being taken to eradicate the pest.

John W. Blain of Grantham said that in two instances the scale had been found in his township, on the farms of Messrs. Cottneyer and Stewart, whose orchards had been inspected, and the infected trees destroyed.

stroyed.
Albert Pay, secretary-treasurer of the Lin Albert Pay, secretary-treasurer of the Lincoln Agricultural Society, and the principal exporter of fruit from this district, thinks that the pest can be eradicated by watching and destroying the orchards now infected, and in carefully selecting the nursery stock now being set out.

Mr. Broderick of Louth, who is one of the foremost fruit growers and shippers of that township, stated that he had in no way suffered from the pest, and that he thought the Government were doing right in trying to stamp it out.

Mr. Robert Thompson, President of Grantham Township Agricultural Society, stated that only the two farms referred to by Mr. Blain had been found to be infested, the trees of which had been destroyed.

Drastic Measures Hight.

Drastic Measures Right.

M. Burrell, director of the experimental station for the Township of Louth, and one of the best-informed men on fruit growing and all matters pertaining thereto, considers that the Government are doing the right thing, and that the most drastic measures should be used to stamp out the pest. Mr. Burrell, who is an authority, supposes that the San Jose scale is a native of Japan, as there are and have been found in that country specimens of a scale, if not eaxctly the same, at least very similar to it.

Many more besides the above gentlemen were interviewed, some of them stating that the pest was a blessing in disguise, as it had led many to make a study of it, as well as the many other pests that are the enemies of the fruit grower.

Others again stated that if half of the fruit trees of the Niagara district were cut down it would be a good thing for all concerned, as there had been an over-production, and it is stated that many of the farmers who at one time were well-to-do, when engaged in mixed farming, have become bankrupt by going into wholesale fruit growing.
