A DUBONIC PLAQUE SCARE

Fishermen at San Francisco Were Afraid to Touch the Bodies of Victims.

WASHINGTON IS ON THE ALERT.

States in Regard to Quarantine Will Be Rigidly Enforced by the Authorities.

San Francisco, June 29.—The bodies of two Japanese sailors who died of the plague ship Nippon Maru were found in the bay yesterday and towed to a point of shore by fishermen, who were afraid to touch the bodies more than was necessary to attach the rope to them for towing purposes.

Washington, June 29.—The marine hospital officials here will take no chances of the introduction of the bubonic plague into this country by any relaxation of the rules.
