

ROYAL WEDDING AT MADRID

Princess of Asturias and Prince Charles of Bourbon United in Marriage.

THE PROCEEDINGS WERE SOLEMN
And in Striking Contrast to the Enthusiasm Displayed in Holland a Week Ago.

Madrid, Feb. 14.—In the chapel of the Royal Palace, in the presence of the Royal Family and all the aristocracy and officials of Spain, Don Carlos, Prince of Asturias, was today wedded to Princess of Asturias, the daughter of the Emperor of Austria, who was today wedded to Prince Charles of Bourbon.

The weather was perfect, the streets were unusually full and crowds gathered in the vicinity of the palace to witness the arrivals.

The city is absolutely calm, but there are no decorations, and no flags nor bunting are displayed, except at the church building. The people are attired in festive dress.

The civil authorities have resigned their powers to the military, and cavalry regiments are patrolling the streets.

A CONFERENCE SUGGESTED

Of Municipalities to Take Steps to Protect Themselves From Powerful Influences.

TELEPHONE COMPANY'S RIGHTS
In the City Discussed at the Board of Control Yesterday Afternoon—Other Topics.

The opinion was expressed some time ago by Ald. Urquhart that the Bell Telephone Co. had no right whatever to erect poles in the city, and in connection with this Corporation Council Bulletin made a report to the Board of Control at its meeting yesterday afternoon.

The recommendation that the city serve notice on the company that, hereafter, if they erect poles, they must do so subject to the contention of the city that they have no right to.

The Mayor, in the act of construction, is that we have a right to prohibit the erection of poles. But the courts have presumed that poles that have been erected, and that have stood for some time, without objection being made, have been placed there with the city's permission.

It is advisable to give notice so as to save that construction of the law, to it being implied that we gave consent to the erection of poles, I think it desirable for the City Engineer to make a plan, showing all the existing poles, so that it would be clear what poles had been erected since the notice had been sent out to the company.

At the same time, the Mayor suggested that the company be asked to remove the poles which had been erected since the notice had been sent out to the company.

The recommendation in the Corporation Council's letter will be acted upon.

Before discussing the subject, the Mayor made a practical suggestion that met with approval. He suggested that the city should call a conference of all the companies which have poles in the city, for the purpose of discussing and taking steps to protect themselves against railway companies and other powerful influences.

The controllers for the balance of the meeting occupied themselves with considering the matter of the various kinds of roadways.

Mr. Mackenzie Bowell tried to find out if any important Government measures were to be brought down in the Senate this year.

Senator Mills said there would be bills to amend the Election Act in the Commons, also restoring the Superior Court. The Senate met in the afternoon and adjourned till March 6.
