Rev. Dr. Carman asked when a prohibitory did not know their constitutional limitations would allow. clared it was necessary that Canadian trade should go on Canadian bottoms thru Canadian channels. He hoped to see a direct channel to Quebec from Montreal of 30 feet depth within two years.

Mr. Polson spoke briefly, and said he hoped to see the time when there would be a three cent rate on grain from Winnipeg to Montreal. Mr. Tarte made a second speech in response to a toast to him. He reviewed the works he had done while in office. He declared that he was not the master of the administration, but if he were he would build a fast Atlantic steamship line, would improve harbors, deepen canals and complete a link between the exerted in aiding the government to enforce the present law.
