OXFORD STILL LIBERAL DEFIES GOLD AND GLITTER

Haultain Disappointed But Will Keep Up Fight

London, June 13.—(Special.)—The cabinet minister and Canada will have Charles E. Haultain. The returns give a majority of 329, three wards showing gains for him. The result is nothing less than a personal victory. His newspaper here made the campaign on the one issue, "London cannot afford to turn down Haultain." Across the first page the words "Canada wants Haultain" were flashed daily, and the autonomy bill was almost lost sight of in the notes that were made on behalf of Haultain.

The cabinet minister, and an attempt was made to show that Billy Gray was an enemy of the laboring man. Gray relied on getting the bulk of this vote, but an analysis of the returns does not bear out forecasts of his workers. The Haultain gains were not confined to one section. They were pretty general all over the city.

The Catholic vote went solid for Haultain. This vote was worth 750, 1000, and the Conservatives say they usually get between 100 and 300. This was a dead loss to Gray, and added to it was the defection of those Conservatives to whom the cry of a cabinet minister for London appealed.

A large vote was tallied, 257 more than in November last, when Haultain defeated Gray by only 745. The slimness of the Liberal majority in November was put down at the time to over-confidence, as the Conservative candidate entered the field only a week before polling day. Haultain's majority of over 600 in 1905 is said to be more indicative of his real strength.

PARIS COMES TO MONTREAL'S RELIEF Company is Prepared to Install a New Gas Plant.

Montreal, June 13.—(Special.)—An important offer was received from Paris at the city hall to-day in regard to supplying the city with an entirely new gas plant. The Paris company is willing to install a gas plant at the cost of seven million francs, and if the city consents will send two engineers out to Canada for the purpose of considering the whole matter of establishing a new gas plant in Montreal.

The company would prefer that the city would allow the main building, etc., of a new company to be constructed near the wharves and railway, in order that coal could be got without the cost of extra transportation.

BRITAIN STANDS BY FRANCE.
Will Take No Part in Moroccan Conference.

London, June 13.—Great Britain as one of the powers signatory of the Madrid Convention of 1880, in answer to the request to the Sultan of Morocco to join an international conference for the consideration of the Moroccan question, has announced that its preference is not to take any part in the conference unless such action would be satisfactory to France.

SCOTT FURNITURE COMPANY'S SEVEN STOREY BUILDING IN WINNIPEG TOTALLY DESTROYED—FOUR FIRE- MEN HURT—FIRE APPLIANCES IN- EFFICIENT.

Winnipeg, June 13.—(Special.)—An extraordinary heavy thunderstorm struck the city at 7:30 to-night. Shortly after the storm broke the Scott Furniture Co.'s new premises on Main-street, between St. Mary's and Graham-avenues, were struck by lightning and a general fire alarm was turned in. A strong southerly wind enabled the flames to make rapid headway, and the efforts of the whole department have but now (11:30 p.m.) got the conflagration under control. While fighting the flames from ladders Jarman Wolf, fireman, grabbed a live wire and fell to the ground. Although seriously burned, hopes are entertained for his recovery. Three other firemen were knocked off the ladders and were seriously hurt, ambulance, but were not seriously hurt.

The total loss will be over a quarter million, \$100,000 for building and over \$150,000 for contents. The building has been erected but a few months, and the furniture store was the biggest in the west and among the finest in the Dominion.

The loss is covered by insurance, the well insured among various companies operating here. The fire conclusively proved the deficiencies in the city's fire appliances and the danger from the low pressure system now obtaining. The building was under contract with the fire department could do no effective work about the fourth storey, while attempting to erect the water tower, while owing to the net-work of wires on Main-street.

A prominent fire insurance man says that decent appliances should have checked the fire at the outset. The building was solid brick, but the fire was so fierce that both side walls fell out.

Has Been "Raising" Bills.

Kingston, June 13.—(Special.)—The man who has been passing raised bills in Eastern Ontario for several months is resting tonight in the police cell. He had on him two Canadian ones raised to ten, and two American ones raised to ten, and the work is cleverly executed. A box of paints and brushes lately used, receipts for a photograph process, a bottle of acid for developing, a dry wash, a bottle of hair oil, a loaded revolver and a box of cigars were found in his room.

1200 MEN STRIKE TO AID GRIPPLE
His Job Taken Away From Him and They Want It Back.

GRECIAN PREMIER MURDERED BY PROFESSIONAL GAMBLER

Athens, June 13.—Theodore P. Deliyannis, the popular premier of Greece, was stabbed and mortally wounded by a professional gambler named Gherakaris at the main entrance of the chamber of deputies at 5 p.m. to-day. The premier died within three hours. The assassin, who was immediately arrested, said he committed the deed in revenge for the stringent measures taken by Premier Deliyannis against the gambling houses, all of which were recently closed.

The premier arrived at the entrance of the chamber in a carriage. Gherakaris approached, saluted the premier and opened the carriage door. The premier was in the act of thanking Gherakaris for his courtesy when the gambler plunged a long dagger into Mr. Deliyannis' abdomen, inflicting a frightful wound.

Lynching of the assassin was prevented only by the gardener, who rushed him from the building to the prison. It is estimated that 20,000 persons followed the body of the premier from the Red Cross Station to his late residence.
