I had a good tenor voice, and often I sang duets with Florence Nightingale to help cheer up the sick and wounded soldiers. She had a high soprane voice. I remember one duet we used to sing a great deal, "What Are the Wild Waves Saying?" She used to call me 'Billy' and 'Brother. She was a medium-sized, slender woman, with dark hair and eyes, very much beloved by everyone.
