

It was decided to communicate with the C. P. R. authorities in Montreal, asking them, if possible, to find a remedy which should lessen the evil, or overcome it altogether.
"The condition of the congestion

caused in C. P. R. freight by the Grand Trunk strike is rapidly ameliorating," said General Superintendent Operne. yesterday. 'We are handling from to 100 per cent, more inward freight than usual and naturally that must in some measure suffer, but there is absolutely no delay in outgoing freight. No expense is being spared to relieve the situation as quickly as possible. We are taking and using to the best of our ability every available man who applies for work—we are even utilizing our old sheds at Queen's wharf, af-fording splendid accommodation for

our ocean freight.' "It would more than help matters along if things were properly handled at the warehouses," added Mr. Langton, superintendent of the Dominion Transport Co. "Teamsters arrive at the appointed time to get their loads, and often undergo no end of delays before receiving their consignments."
A costly freight wreck, indirectly due to the congestion of C. P. R. traffic, took place about 2 a.m. yesterday, near the railway crossing at Ossington-avenue.
