AT OSGOOD HALL

A suit over the Proposal of Kingsville's Council to Buy the Gas Company.

The corporation of the Village of Kingsville is quite an honorable one. Unlike the Mayor and Corporation of Hamilton, who refused to pay the bill for the gas, the Kingsville Council is quite willing to carry out its contract with Mr. Simpson to pay him \$1700 for buying for natural gas on part of lot 7, in the first concession of the Township of Gosfield South. Mr. Simpson has bored down 300 feet, and 12 gas in sufficient quantity to strike the Village of Kingsville will be the most brilliant lighted village on earth. But Mr. Wile, a railwayer of the village, objects. In his action for an injunction he alleges that the council passed bylaw No. 141 to raise \$18,200 to mine for the gas to supply the village, but, as that is the whole scope of the bylaw, there is no authority to contract with Mr. Simpson.

He has given judgment upholding his contention. The learned judge decides that under sections 282 and 288 of the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1882, a councillor can only act by properly executed bylaw, and that the resolution of the council, subsequently passed, to enable the corporation to contract with Mr. Simpson, was not a bylaw, nor does it profess to be one, nor is it properly executed, and, as the contract with Mr. Simpson is not within the scope of bylaw 141, it is invalid, and the injunction granted should be absolute and perpetual, and accordingly, thus, by the stern mandate of the law, the unfortunate townspeople are left in the dark.

Liverpool Futures Declined

1-2d for the Day.

LOCAL MARKETS ARE DULL

Toronto Railway Shares are Higher

on Good Buying.

Canadian Pacific and Commercial Cable are Firm—Consols Unchanged—A Steadier Market on Wall-Street for Stocks, But the Close was Irregular—Decline in Provisions at Chicago—Local Market for Live Hogs Weaker—Latest Commercial News.

Friday Evening, April 2.

Liverpool wheat futures fell lower. Cash wheat in Chicago 1/2c higher at 70 1/2c. May wheat on curb 7 1/2c.

Put on May wheat 70 1/2c to 70 3/4c; calls 24 1/2c.

At Toledo clover seed closed at \$4.00 cash. Receipts of grain at Chicago today: Wheat 9, corn 70, oats 122. Estimated for Saturday: Wheat 10, corn 147, oats 174.

Receipts of wheat at Liverpool the past three days, 54,000 cwt., including 46,000 cwt. of American. Corn, same time, 284,800 cwt.

Estimated receipts of hogs at Chicago today 10,000; official Thursday 24,000; left over 2500; estimated for Saturday 12,000.

Trade active, with early strength lost. Heavy shippers \$3.80 to \$4.17.

Cattle receipts at Chicago today 3500. Market steady; nothing fancy offering.

Exports at New York today: Flour 1870 barrels and 1045 sacks. Wheat 67,000 bushels.

Receipts of wheat at Minneapolis and Duluth today 288 cars, as against 438 cars last Friday.

Reports from foreign crop prospects confirmed previous bullish advice, especially from France, where too much rain has retarded spring seeding and reduced the area below that of last year of 1895. Russian outlook is also said to be satisfactory, notably in the South and Southwest, where much from Argentine cut down the exportable surplus.

Wheat—The local wheat market continues quiet, and prices are unchanged. Red winter wheat is quoted at 72c to 73c, west, and white at 74c, on the Northern No. 1.

Barley—The market is steady, with a moderate demand. No. 1 quoted at 28c to 29c, No. 2 at 27c, No. 3 extra at 24c, and No. 3 at 23c.

Oats—The demand is quiet, with prices generally unchanged. Sales of white at 19c, west, and 20c to 21c, east.
