

Ottawa, July 26.—(Canadian Press,)—Creamery butter stocks in cold storage in Canada on July 1 were 221/4 per cent. less than last year, but no less than 315 per cent, heavier than in the previous month, according to the report of the internal trade division of the statistical bureau, department of agriculture, covering the month of June, just issued, Butter in storage amounted to 8,855,657 pounds of creamery and 372,435 pounds of dairy. In the case of dairy butter, the amount in storage was 19 per cent.
