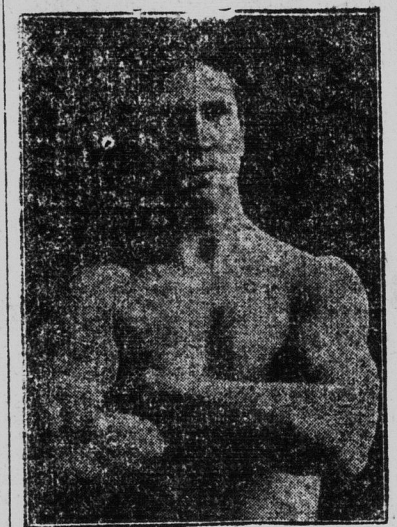

### KILLED BY A RUNAWAY TEAM

Alexander Lemoine of North Sydney Knocked Down and Run Over by Heavy Coal Team.

North Sydney, N. S., Oct. 25.—An accident occurred at North Sydney this afternoon which resulted in a half hour later in the death of Alexander Lemoine, senior member of the firm of Lemoine Bros, and a nephew of Rev. N. Lemoine, of Halifax.

Mr. Lemoine had just gone from his store to his parents' home on King street for dinner when he noticed a horse attached to a cart with a load of coal running down the street with a small boy driving. Rushing out on the muddy street Mr. Lemoine endeavored to stop the runaway, when the shaft point of the cart struck and knocked him down, the wheel of the heavy vehicle passing over his chest.
