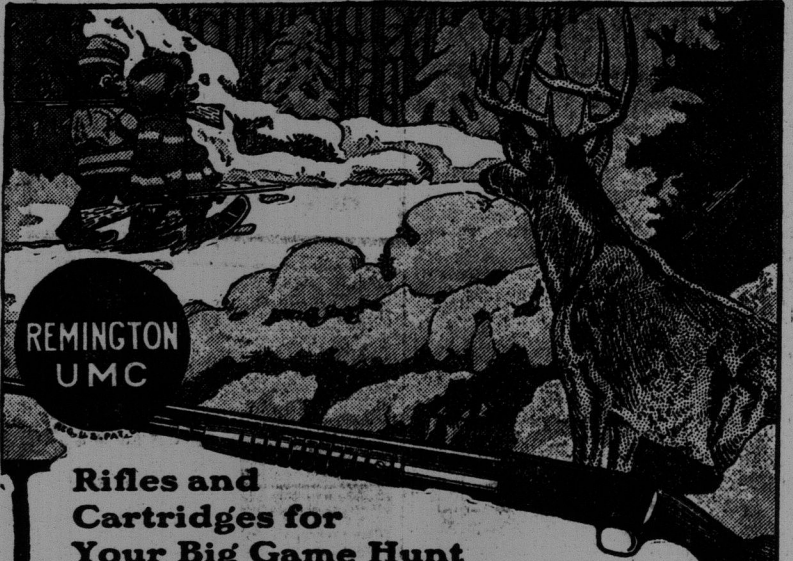

## St. John Men Respond To Call For 104th Battalion

Recruits in The City Yesterday Totalled 119—Lieut. Col. Fowler's Rousing Speech—Officers Announced

All previous patriotic rallies held in the city since the outbreak of the war have been eclipsed through last night's remarkable demonstration in honor of the 104th. Crowds poured into the streets to join in or witness the several parades that wended towards the Queen's rink for the big meeting and the building was filled to overflowing, men almost entirely composing the audience. Five bands concentrated towards the rink, the 92nd, Temple, City Cornet, Carleton Cornet, and St. John Brass Band, each playing spirited marching airs as they went along with crowds following, seeking admission to the meeting. And the meeting was successful in getting recruits too, 119 entered their names on the roll. Lieut. Col. Fowler was given a hearty reception by the audience which numbered fully 3,000 while all along the route to the rink he was cheered at different times. His speech at the meeting was received with applause. Lieut. Col. Fowler of Halifax made a stirring appeal for men in his characteristic style and, Lieut. W. Barnes, of the 104th, who rather than stay at home had enrolled in the ranks of the 64th as a private, described the life of the soldiers in camp in an entertaining manner.

Lieutenant-Colonel Fowler said, when introduced by the chairman of the meeting, Colonel E. F. Sturges, that he had not come to tell the people of St. John the merits of the great conflict, on that the minds of all had been made up. But even so, he took it that they would fight for their country, right or wrong. Every man capable of bearing arms was wanted. They would not be beaten if every man who was now sitting on the bench would get down and join the ranks. (Cheers.)

The enemy was really at the gates. Canada was, he assured them, in imminent danger and he replied to all who doubted by saying that New Brunswick homes were in danger, danger that could only be averted by New Brunswick men getting into the fight. Their gates were on the fields of Flanders. (Cheers.) There the gallant 25th Battalion—(Cheers)—had already done well.

Going on after a tribute to the British navy, Lieutenant-Colonel Fowler said that he was an older man than many of the audience but he had found it far harder to stay at home when he read of the call for men than it was to go. He would have been ashamed to face his townsmen if he had not done all that he could to pass on the heritage he had received—the precious boon of liberty. (Cheers.)

"There are homes in St. John that have been saddened by the deaths in the 26th Battalion that so recently was marching in your streets. They tell on the field of action—for you and for me. And shall their deaths be in vain? Will you young men not strengthen the lines so that they shall not have fallen in vain for that liberty and that freedom that is assured to you? So long as a man feels the vigor of youth in his veins he is not too old—no matter how many years have been marked on the dial. (Cheers.)

He then spoke of the death of Miss Cavell and added: "That is the sort of treatment that your wife and sister, your daughters and sweethearts will be subject to if the Germans gain the ascendancy. That event can only be prevented by every man doing his duty. Why should I fight for you? Why should you not do your own fighting? There is no reason why one young man should be accompanying girls to the theatres when his companion is undergoing privation to keep him there."

After a reference to the splendid tradition of the New Brunswick 104th Regiment, Lieutenant-Colonel Fowler said that whatever short-comings he might have for the honored post of commander, he would do all that he could to make the short-comings good. The government had given him a free hand in the selection of his officers and he had only one standard, that of merit. They hoped by that means to make the 104th—the crack regiment of the Maritime provinces. (Cheers.) Whatever sacrifice they were called upon to make, he questioned whether it was greater than the old Loyalists had undertaken, and his ancestors had come to St. John, he added, when it was only Fort York.

Only Merit Counts.  
"You know me in the past for a strong partisan. I have been that, but I never yet hit below the belt. I have been willing to take hits as well as to give them. But there is no question of politics or race, or religion in this battle. It is only one thing counts and that is merit." (Cheers.)
