A STRANGE CASE

Story of Girl Prisoner in New York Tombs

HER DREAM FIANCÉ

Affluence of Baker's Daughter and Sale of Customs House Jobs to Neighbors—Arrest When No Positions Materialize

Locked up in the New York Tombs, a federal prisoner, charged with persuading two dozen confiding persons to give her \$100 each to get them jobs in the United States customs service, is Caroline Klink, seventeen years old, fair, with big blue eyes and pretty, there is a streak of the romantic in her and she liked to dream of knights and princes and a sweetheart with power and \$1,000,000.

It was this sweetheart, who, the customs authorities believe selected only in the imagination of the girl, that brought about the arrest of herself and of her father, Jacob Klink, a baker. Ever since her arrest she has persisted in talking of her lover who is to come like the knight of old and rescue her from her prison.

The troubles of Jacob Klink and his daughter began with the new year. The story of their prosperity and arrest is common talk in the neighborhood of 1,489 Avenue A, where the Klink family lived up to a month ago.

Caroline began to show evidence of a properly far beyond that which is usual in that part of Avenue A. She bought good clothes and began to develop an unexpected love for rich flowers. SASKATCHEWAN TELLS

LLOYD GEORGE ABOUT CLOSING ALL THE BARS

Arranging Day of Provincial Rejoicing For July 4—News Notes From The West

Regina, April 12.—To Chancellor Lloyd George, Lord, Retail sale of all alcoholic liquors in bars and clubs will be abolished throughout province of Saskatchewan July 4. Temperance forces in convention congratulate Great Britain on prospect of drastic curtailment of liquor traffic in our neighbor land. George Lloyd, President. This resolution was passed at a convention of the "Saskatchewan Branch of the Bar Association of 100" in Regina recently. The committee also approved of a resolution congratulating the government on its stand in the interest of temperance. A day of provincial rejoicing will be held on Sunday, July 4, when the "bars" will have been banished in Saskatchewan. The Pharmaceutical Association of Saskatchewan in convention here endorsed the attitude of the government and also added a rider requesting the government to provide for the restriction of the sale of spirituous liquors by druggists, excepting for strictly medicinal use and then only on the written prescription of a qualified medical or veterinary practitioner. This association also voted \$500 towards the relief of Belgian druggists who have suffered as a result of the war.

A new industry is in process of organization in Regina, which aims to manufacture steel culverts. In addition to the cultivation of all vacant lots in Regina the vacant lot gardeners' association aims to cultivate fifty more acres of land owned by the city, on a co-operative basis. That Regina in particular and Saskatchewan in general was suffering from the financial depression than the greater part of the United States, particularly the southern states, was the impression gained by Lieutenant-governor Brown, who on a trip to attend the celebration of the centenary of peace in New Orleans.

An important move towards co-operative stock marketing was made at the executive meeting of the Live Stock Raisers' recently, when a committee representing the grain growers and the live stock men, was appointed to investigate the question, and report as early as possible to the executive of the live stock men.

The funeral will take place at 2.30 Tuesday afternoon.
