

# INTEREST OF FANS NOW CENTRED ON GAME AT SUSSEX TOMORROW

## ATLANTICS GO INTO LEAD BY WIN LAST NIGHT

Todd Thompson Scores All Three Goals for Fusiliers—Big Crowd Present

ATTENTION of local hockey fans is now centred on the game tomorrow night between the Saint John Fusiliers and the Sussex Colts, which will be played at Sussex. The Colts scored a win over the Moncton Athletics and the Fusiliers will have no easy time pulling out on the long end of the score. Should the local team win it would place them on even terms with the Athletics. A special train has been chartered to take the team and its supporters to Sussex for the game, and it is expected that the rink will be filled to capacity by the time the game is called.

### MONCTON WINS

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 11.—One of the largest crowds to ever pack the arena rink watched the home team turn back the Saint John Fusiliers 3 to 1 last night. By virtue of their win the Athletics have reached the peak of the Southern section, with one more win to their credit than the Saint John team. Both teams were at top form with the goalies in the limelight throughout.

Thompson, of the Fusiliers, was the outstanding player on the ice, carrying the fight to the Moncton net throughout. He notched all three of the Saint John tallies. Earl Kervin and Lloyd Wilson starred for the Athletics each accounting for two goals. Kervin was a sore spot for the Saint John goalies all of the evening, drilling bullet-like drives at him from the wing.

There was very little to choose between the teams in the first period, the Moncton team pulling through with the old scoring punch in the critical moments.

Bidlake turned in a waste of a game in the Moncton nets, and all three of the Saint John goals were career cut in every way. Wilson played a nice game for Saint John and turned aside many shots labelled for goals.

The game was a close one, with the Moncton forward line working hard in the second period with long shots. Kervin, Kiley, Fraser and Gould were the main attack, with Kervin leading the charge. Thompson notched the third and last Saint John goal when he skated through the entire Moncton team for the prettiest goal of the evening after 12 minutes of play.

One minute later Gould beat the Saint John team only to have Wilson make a wonderful save. Lane came in fast on the rebound and the puck was in the net before Wilson could clear. The Saint John players protested that the puck had been thrown into the net but the goal judge and referee ruled a legitimate goal. The game ended without further scoring.

MY LIFE STORY by Jack McLaughlin

I HAD the lightweight championship of the world handed to me on a silver platter.

Jack Dempsey heard that I had turned pro. He was so impressed with my showing that when he decided to go into the middleweight class he simply sat down and wrote a declaration handing the title over to me. I felt pretty cocky—the lightweight champion of the world.

I guess it is the only case on record of anything of the sort happening, but I defended it against all comers and retired undefeated. A man can't do any better than that, can he?

Madden then started me on a tour of the country. This Irish manager of mine was a great guy. He arranged for John L. Sullivan and the way he put old John L. across was every bit as crafty as the Jack Kearns and Tex Rickards of today.

Paddy Ryan was heavyweight champion, managed by Richard Fox of the Police Gazette. Fox would not consider a challenge unless a \$1,000 side bet was posted. ## SHARKEY AND OTHERS WILL FIGHT IT OUT

Winner to Meet Delaney, the Survivor to Fight Dempsey for Chance at Tunney

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—The two "right hovers" in the heavyweight deck, Jack Delaney and Jack Dempsey, apparently will not be played until the critical "tricks" of the game are involved.

Although Tex Rickard, the principal dealer of the pack, would like to shuffle Delaney in with the rest of the cards, it is increasingly evident that the preliminary plays will be made by Maloney, Sharkey, Dempsey, Hansen, Paulino and possibly Young Stribling, the Georgian who has outgrown his school boy and light heavyweight days.

Rickard already has decided to let Dempsey in reserve. He regards the ex-champion as ranking next to the ace of the pack, Gene Tunney, and plans to discuss with him here in a few weeks a proposal to meet the winner of an elimination series.

DELANEY "WILD DEUCE"

Delaney, meanwhile, looms as the "wild deuce" of the deck. His manager, Pete Reilly, would like to stick with Humbert Fugazy, Rickard's promoting rival, but that would mean losing a chance to lift Tunney's crown. The outcome is likely to be a compromise whereby Delaney contends to meet Maloney or Sharkey, the winner to face Dempsey and thus determine Tunney's chief rival.

Delaney's manager already has started an eloquent campaign to establish a French-Canadian's heavyweight claim.

He points to Delaney's knockout victory over such fighters as Flowers, a former champion, McGillicuddy and Gorman. Furthermore to dispel any notion that Delaney is not heavy enough Reilly has put forward an up-to-date set of statistics showing that his charge has gained a dozen pounds in the last year, developed proportionately to the present figure of 177 and promises to scale about 185 when the outdoor season starts.
