Full Text of Pronouncement of Prelate of the Catholic Church in the United States on Matter of Keen Interest.

IN view of the interest in the prohibition situation, The Times-Star here publishes the full text of a pronouncement on the subject by Cardinal O'Connell of Boston, ranking prelate of the Roman Catholic Church in the United States. Reference was made to it in the despatches. Here is his complete statement:

"I have been asked repeatedly of late to give my views with regard to compulsory universal prohibition," said the Cardinal. "Up to the present I have preferred to keep silence, but the misrepresentation, whether due to ignorance, or malice, of the position of the church generally, and especially in these United States, would seem to require some clear statement on the subject.
