METAGAMA CLOSING C. P. SEASON HERE

Last Sailing Will Be on April 23—Montreal and Quebec Plans Announced

The final Canadian Pacific sailing from the winter port of Saint John for this season will be that of the Metagama for Liverpool on April 23.

SUMMER PLANS

Nine European ports will be afforded direct passenger communication with Montreal and Quebec under seven distinct services called for by a Canadian Pacific summer sailing list issued by W. J. McGiffin, general superintendent. This is in addition to the regular service to European ports by seven freight vessels.

The Empress of Scotland and the Empress of France maintain the Empress express route to Europe from Quebec, while the "Montreal" and "Metagama" will be engaged in the cabin passenger traffic.

Every two weeks there will be an Empress sailing from Quebec to Cherbourg, Southampton and Hamburg. The Montreal, formerly the Empress of Britain, will sail between Quebec and Liverpool, her draught not permitting sailing up to Montreal. The Montclair, Montcalm and Montrose, of 16,400 tonnage, will maintain service between the latter city and Liverpool, calling at Greenock and Belfast on a number of voyages.
