Lieut.-Gov. Todd, Who Loses Property, Offers Reward

BUILDINGS BURNED

Peat Moss Plants, Dwellings and School Those Razed

ST. STEPHEN, June 26.—A fire bug is abroad at the Heathland district. Lt. Governor Todd has for some years been trying to develop a peat moss business in this county, the last time near the Splan pond on the Basswood ridge road. This plant was burned last year, with a considerable loss. Mr. Todd believes in the industry and keeps at it persistently and rebuilds his plant at much expense. A few days ago somebody, as yet unknown, set the place on fire and destroyed it, together with valuable and specially built machinery.

Within a few weeks, two dwellings and the school-house in that vicinity have been set on fire and destroyed and there has been evidence of the use of kerosene. It was in 1895 that Mr. Todd's first peat moss plant down at Musquash was destroyed and he is getting a bit "fed up" with such experience.

Gov. Todd offers \$200 reward for apprehension of the incendiaries.

MUST MAKE GOOD LOSSES OF BANK

Shareholders of Wrecked Institution at Warren, Mass. Held Liable

BOSTON, June 26.—Three well known residents of Worcester, Edward W. Cowee, William J. Thayer and Edward B. Fletcher, and the estate of the late Raymond B. Fletcher, all former stockholders of the Warren National Bank of Worcester, are being sued by the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston, which is now serving a long sentence at Atlanta—must pay large sums as additional assessments on the capital stock to make good part of the \$200,000 loss to the bank, according to the decision of Federal Judge Brewer.

Suit was brought against the respondents by James E. Farrell, receiver of the bank and the court orders Cowee to pay \$10,000; Thayer \$10,000; Fletcher \$2,700 and the estate of Raymond B. Fletcher \$2,700.

Marcine was formerly a barber and by financial juggling obtained control of the bank.

WORCESTER, Mass., June 26.—A wild deer went on a rampage in the heart of the business district here this week and was captured in a Trumbull square furniture store, but not until the frenzied animal had battled three policemen, veterinarian and game warden.

The deer, a doe, was finally taken to the Lake Park Zoo. For more than half an hour the policemen, Theodore Goulet, champion wrestler in the Worcester police department, Hugh McCann, a former football player, and Joseph F. McNamara and Game Warden Jay Snell, battled with the animal in alleys and back yards of Franklin and Trumbull streets until finally the deer ran into the furniture store at 11 Franklin street where it was caught and hog-tied.





N. B. GIRL AWARDED MEDAL FOR BRAVERY

Ferry Steamer on Miramichi Named For Frances Ullock, Chatham Heroine

Awards for bravery as announced by the Royal Canadian Humane Society through Captain George J. Guy, president, include the bronze medal conferred upon Frances Ullock of Chatham.

In the summer of 1924 Miss Ullock, who was then but 14 years of age, rescued Winona Shields and Clara Benson from drowning when the two got beyond their depth while bathing in the Miramichi river near the Miramichi Foundry. Another member of the party, a young man, was drowned, despite her efforts to aid him, while a fourth member of the party managed to scramble to safety unassisted.

It was in honor of her act of bravery that the new Miramichi river ferry, the Frances Ullock, was named.

MOTOR CAR FEES IN N. B. REACH \$450,000

Hon. D. A. Stewart Will Discharge Unsatisfactory Road Patrolmen

Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, says that the collections of motor vehicle fees has made a record to the last date of compilation. The total reported by the Motor Vehicles Branch in collections to June 23 was \$450,000. That amount exceeds considerably the amount collected up to the corresponding date of 1925.

The minister has just completed inspection of highways in Northumberland and Kentville counties. He found the roads in good condition with the exception of some branch roads which were rather rough.

The patrol system was giving good results under the District Engineers. Hon. Mr. Stewart said that patrolmen who when warned of unsatisfactory work, did not show improvement would be removed from duty.

MODERNIST QUIT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Rev. Dr. Tyson Joins Congregationalists and is Deposed by Bishop


NEW YORK, June 25.—The Rev. Dr. Stuart Lawrence Tyson, Modernist lecturer, whose resignation from the Episcopal ministry has been made public, declares that he had "renounced" his ministry "in the Pickwickian sense only."

"As to my quitting the Episcopal church," Dr. Tyson went on, "it is the final result of a process that began during the period through which I was defending Bishop-elect Herbert Shipman against the propaganda of hate wherever it was assailed. I made up my mind that if the church would refuse to elect him I could do my work more adequately elsewhere."

Dr. Tyson, who has joined the Congregational church, has been formally deposed from the priesthood by Bishop Manning of the New York diocese.

TOXIC SMOKE MOST DEADLY

New War Weapon Defies Even Best of Gas Masks

BERLIN, N. H., June 26.—Smoke will be the most effective weapon of human destruction if another war ever embroils any of the leading nations of the world. A deadly toxic smoke, rather than the torturing mustard gas or other poisonous fumes, will be the direct method used to demolish and weaken the enemy to the point where whole armies might be wiped out.

That is the belief of Lieutenant-Colonel George A. Richter, a commander in the chemical warfare division in France in the World War and now a member of the consulting board of the American Chemical Society, which has been a leader in this line of research work since the World War.

The views are also shared by many of the leading chemical engineers of the country, who are here in attendance at the convention of the American Institute of Chemical Engineering. For, up to date, nothing has been devised to combat toxic smoke. Gas masks, so effective against poisonous gases in the World War, are absolutely worthless against the vicious operations of toxic smoke, because smoke will penetrate through these masks.

Chemists throughout the land are now laboring to discover some means of defence against this smoke threat. Toxic smoke is the outstanding development in chemical research since the World War.

Sir Philip Burne-Jones Was Cousin of Kipling and Son of Noted Artist

LONDON, June 25.—Sir Philip Burne-Jones, a painter, and son of the famous painter, Sir Edward Burne-Jones, who died in London this week, was born in 1861, and was educated at Marlborough College and University College, Oxford.

One of Sir Philip's famous works was "The Vampire" based on the poem of that name written by his cousin, Rudyard Kipling. The mothers of Kipling and Burne-Jones were sisters, daughters of a Methodist clergyman, Rev. George Brown MacDonald. Another daughter of the Rev. MacDonald was the mother of the famous Kipling, and a fourth, Lady Poynter, mother of Sir Hugh Edward Poynter.





MACKEREL THICK ALONG NORTH SHORE

Salmon Fishing Rather Poor—Lobsters More Plentiful Recently

CHATHAM, June 26.—The salmon fishing to date has been rather poor on the north side of the Miramichi river this season with the exception of a few stands which have done fairly well. From Bay du Vin up to Pt. Cheval the fishing has been up to the average. From Pt. Cheval up river on the south side the fishing has been below the average. The drifters at Escuminac got started later than usual, as the fish seemed to have reached our shore later than other years, perhaps due to the very late spring.

The mackerel fishing at Shippan and Tracadie districts has been very good and there is a heavy run of mackerel on the coast at present.

The lobster fishing at the early part of the season was not up to the average, but the fishing at the latter part of the season has been better than at the same time last year.

Inspector Kerr Gets After Many Motorists

Colin Kerr, Inspector for Charlotte county under the N. B. Motor Vehicle Act reports that matters in connection with license tags, chauffeurs' permits, etc., are being rapidly straightened out. In a large number of cases he found persons owning and operating two or more cars who were switching their license plates. These have been held up and obliged to secure a license for each car. In very many cases drivers running cars other than their own were doing so without the necessary chauffeur's permit. Inspector Kerr is also enforcing the speed law.

Hereafter all American trucks coming on this side must purchase a N. B. license plate.

SAINT JOHN-BOSTON TRAIN SERVICE

For some time past there has been no train leaving Saint John for Boston on Sunday evenings, neither has train left Boston on Saturday evenings for Saint John. Commencing Saturday, July 3, train will leave Boston on Saturdays the same as on other days, and Express will leave Saint John on Sunday evenings, the same as on other days. This will establish a seven day a week service between Saint John and Boston and vice versa.
