PITTSBURG PIRATES CAPTURE SERIES FROM NEW YORK GIANTS WIN THREE OUT Plan To Hold 10 Mile Road Race In Connection With Local Exhibition

Now Have Commanding Lead In Pennant Race

NEW YORK, Aug. 24—The Pirates have all but shoved the Glants off the plank. McGraw and his crew have only a meagre toe-hold now to prevent Pittsburg capturing the National League title. The best New York could do yesterday was to divide a double-header with the Pirates, winning the opener, 7 to 4, and taking a setback in the night cap, 8 to 2. Rawlings, a Glant castoff, drove in the winning run in the second game. The Corsairs continue with their five-game lead on the top rung and have the present series already in the bag with three victories. The final game is to-day.
