PARTIES PLAN ELECTION FIGHT

Speech Making Tours of
Saint John-Albert Being
Arranged

Sympathy for Mayor Potts in
Illness—Two More Nomin-
ations to Complete List.

With both political parties preparing their ammunition and laying their strategic plans, the battle in this constituency promises to be a hard-fought one from the very start. Committees are putting the finishing touches on their organization work and are getting ready for nearly three weeks of strenuous campaigning for votes. The candidates also are busy making final preparations for the speech-making tours that are facing them.

The first guns of the Liberal party will be fired on Thursday evening in Fairville and East Saint John, where the candidates will be heard on the commencement of their tour. They will speak in the Temperance Hall in Fairville and in Peck's Hall in East Saint John. There will probably be other speakers as well.

The plans of the Conservative party for speaking tours will probably be brought pretty well in order at a meeting of the speaking committee tonight. A meeting of the executive was held last night to continue the organization work. Ward headquarters will be opened immediately.

A RESOLUTION.

A resolution expressing sympathy to Mayor P. L. Potts in his illness and a hope that he might speedily recover in order that his assistance could be given at this election was passed and was ordered sent by telegram to him in New York.

The Liberal party organization was completed at a meeting last night at which the candidates made brief addresses emphasizing the need for concerted effort from now until election day.

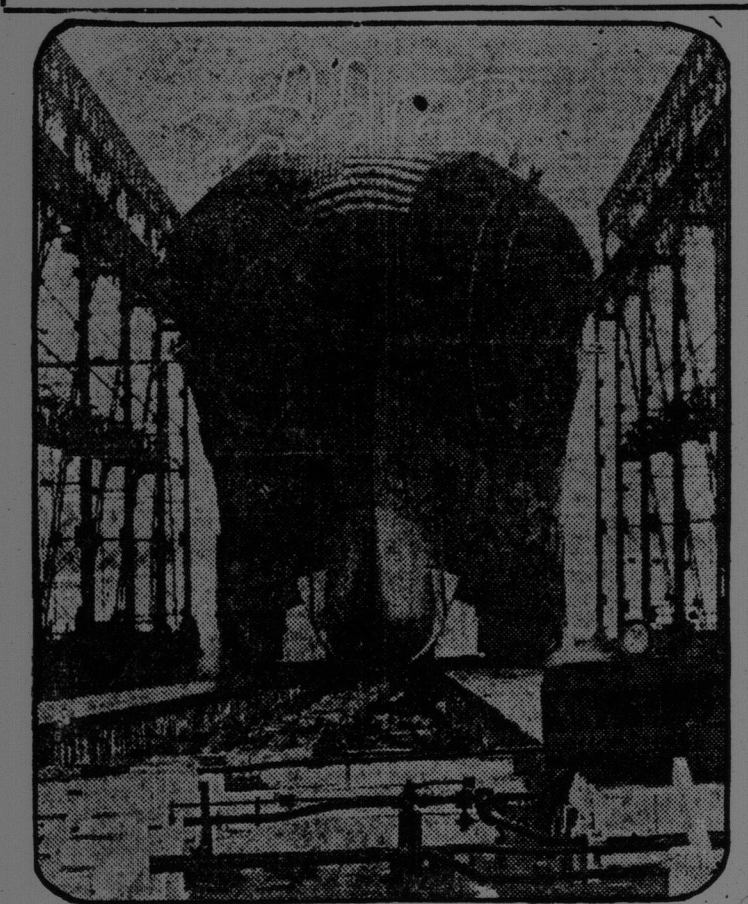

TWO MORE NOMINATIONS

Only two more candidates remain to be nominated to complete the slate of both parties in New Brunswick for the federal election contest on Oct. 20. The Conservative line-up is complete with 11 men in the field. The Liberals have nominated eight straight party men, but must select a standard-bearer for Charlotte and another for York-Sunbury. These will be chosen at conventions to be held respectively at St. Stephen on Thursday and at Fredericton on Wednesday.

the last House, who is running as an independent Liberal-Progressive; consequently there will be no straight Liberal candidate in that constituency.

AMONG POSSIBILITIES.

Among those mentioned for the nomination when the York-Sunbury convention meets at the court house in Fredericton on Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 the name of G. R. Hawkins, barrister, of Fredericton, stands out prominently. Others spoken of as possibilities are Hon. D. W. Merseure, Minister of Agriculture in the Veniot Government; J. J. F. Winslow, who ran in Fredericton-Devon-Maryville in the provincial election; R. B. Smith, former M. L. A., and P. J. Hughes, K. C.

The convention for Charlotte county is called for Thursday afternoon in the Queen Theatre, St. Stephen, and it is understood there will be three names before the convention. The one most spoken of at present is that of W. A. Holt, of St. Andrews, well known insurance agent.

U. S. NAVY'S LONGEST SHIP LAUNCHED

Inter-Parliamentary Union Delegates Remark Development of Canada.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 13.—The members of the Inter-Parliamentary Union will conclude their 28th annual conference today in the second capital of a big nation of the new world which they have visited during their sessions. After being the guests of the Province of Ontario and the City of Toronto yesterday they left the provincial government centre shortly after three o'clock on two special C. N. R. trains and arrived in Ottawa seven hours later.

The journey was an uneventful one, but the interest of the representatives of practically every civilized country of the world did not lapse for a minute. Those who had not visited Canada previously expressed themselves as astounded at the fine country which they saw and at its high development, both agriculture and commercial.

COMMENT ON TRAINS.

One particular point of interest was the fine railway equipment and the length and weight of the freight trains which they saw on their trip was the source of particular comment. The arrival at the Union Station was an impressive one. A special detachment of police was drawn up in the concourse and a short distance away stood representatives of the government and the various consular services to welcome them. After this brief reception the visitors went to the Chateau Laurier where they spent the night. The delegates will spend the day in Ottawa and subsequently will go to Montreal and Quebec City when the convention trip will be brought to a close.

Suit Costs \$250

WINS PULITZER RACE AT 248.99 MILES AN HOUR

MITCHELL FIELD, N. Y., Oct. 12.—Covered with grime and glory, with his plane shooting flames in the gathering darkness of evening Lieutenant Cyrus Bellis, United States Army, today won the Pulitzer trophy race, feature of the National Air Races, broke the world's speed record of 246 miles per hour for a close circuit course, and established a new record of 248.99 miles per hour.

ROT HITS SPUDS IN KINGS COUNTY

SUSSEX, Oct. 12.—Rot is badly affecting the potato crop in Kings county, and some of the local farmers report that they will lose as much as 50 to 75 per cent. of their total crop. Throughout the county the rot is more or less prevalent and will mean a serious loss and a considerable shortage in the crop yield.

ONLY ONE WRECKED

ST. GEORGE, Oct. 13.—It was reported here today that the Cora Gardie was the only one of the alleged rum-running fleet that was wrecked in the storm of Saturday and Sunday. It was said that one of the fleet sought refuge in Beaver Harbor and another in New River but both left when the weather cleared up. It was reported that a three-master had been wrecked off Campbell and this was believed to be a schooner which had unloaded a cargo of coal at Calais and was bound for Eastport. It was said the crew had been saved and were at Eastport.

VISITORS PLEASSED WITH THE DOMINION

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Bath Too Hot, Baby 'Fatal' Scalded

WINNIPEG, Oct. 12.—Placed in a hot bath at the home of the Good Shepherd, Donald Simpson, two and a half years old, was fatally scalded on Sunday. The youngster died in the hospital after several hours of great agony.

A maid at the home had charge of the baby and had prepared the bath, but states she did not know the water was dangerously hot. Authorities have commenced an investigation.

Dutch Queen Cuts Employees' Wages

THE HAGUE, Oct. 12.—The royal household budgets these days are subject to the same economic laws as those of the humbler individuals and Queen Wilhelmina has found it necessary to notify all her employees that their salaries will be cut by 10 per cent. as from Jan. 1 next.

In doing this Her Majesty is simply following the example set by her various government departments where the salaries have been readjusted in a downward direction, not without violent protest on the part of the victims, who, like most wage-earners in other countries, find that the actual cost of living does not necessarily move along with official index figures.

Saint John Man And 7 Others Rescued

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—The New York Evening Post today publishes a story of the rescue of eight men, one of them a Canadian and all members of the crew of the United States Coast Guard Cutter No. 184, fled from on board the passenger liner Republic which picked up the men after they had been adrift for two days in a severe storm.

A mile, a seaman, of Saint John, was the Canadian member of the cutter's crew which was saved after the gruelling experience of being tossed about for 48 hours by the seas.

ALBERTA GENERAL Election Unlikely

EDMONTON, Alta., Oct. 13.—Although no official statement was issued at the conclusion of the caucus on the part of the members of the Alberta government, it is understood that no immediate general election will be held.

It is believed that by-elections will be held in the regular course to fill the six vacancies in the house, caused by Liberal and Independent members resigning to enter the federal campaign.

Premier Greenfield described the story that he might resign, as "poppycock."

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U. S. Army and Navy Are Accused of Waste

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—The army and navy were charged today by Chairman Madden, of the House appropriations committee, with squandering millions of dollars "in a purposeless, meaningless, endless experimental orgy" in technical aircraft development.

Citing testimony by Major-General Mason M. Patrick, chief of the Army Air Service, the 263 pursuit planes purchased by the army had been found deficient in vision requirements, Mr. Madden said he had "heard something of a charge of criminal negligence that borders on criminal waste."

FAUTEUX SLATED TO RUN.

MONTREAL, Oct. 12.—Hon. Henri Fauteux, former member of the Meighen cabinet, is slated as a probable Conservative candidate in the constituency of Bagot, it was stated at Conservative headquarters here today. This constituency was represented in the last parliament by Joseph E. Marcell, Liberal.
