Harding Touches Upon International Questions

GOOD THINGS COMING

TO THE THEATRES

OF ST. JOHN

Empress Tonight

Urges Entry to Permanent Court in Address Published by Secretary.

San Francisco, Aug. 1-In an addent Harding presented the view of his administration on pending inter-national relationships affecting the U. St and urged participation by the United States in the permanent court of international justice as the next major step to be taken.
In urging U. S. support of the court, he declared:

"I do not know that such a court will be unfailing in the avoidence of war, but I know it is a step in the right direction, and will prove an advance toward international peace for which the conflictive conscience of mankind is calling.
