FLOODS AND CYCLONES.
Storm Sweeps Over Sahara—Train in Middle of Lake.

Bursa, Algeria, Nov. 29.—A cyclone, accompanied by torrential rains, has raged for three days over the region of Sahara, between Gheddah, sixty miles south of this city, and Touggourt, the desert railway terminus. The Biskra-Touggourt railway line has been cut in five places by floods, and a train which left here was stalled in the middle of a lake, measuring 100 square kilometers. The passengers, who were rescued, were taken to Djamma, and returned here, their train in some places passing through water sixteen inches deep.

At Meled, where no rain had fallen since 1917, the native quarter was washed away. At Touggourt the personnel was forced to abandon the railroad station.
