#### RECENT DEATHS

Mr. Mary J. Burgess, widow of John Burgess, died at her home, Moulton, New Brunswick, on Thursday, aged sixty-three years. She is survived by two sons, John of Gagetown, and Charles at home, also by one daughter, Mrs. Charles Clark of Woodstock.

William J. Hill, aged seventy-one years, died at his home in Millville Wednesday morning. He is survived by his wife and five children, Mrs. Henry Bowles, Gardiner, Me.; Mrs. Charles Paumer, Millville; Mrs. Mrs. Henry Benjamin and James.

The death of John O'Rourke occurred at the residence of his son, Frank O'Rourke, Moncton. Mr. O'Rourke was in the employ of the Canadian Government Railways for thirty-five years, retiring on the Provident Fund some five years ago. His wife died five years ago. He is survived by three sons—F. O'Rourke, of Winnipeg; John O'Rourke, travelling fuel agent of the C. N. R., and residing at Winnipeg; and Frank O'Rourke, chief clerk in the stores and mechanical department, C. G. R., Moncton. The late Mr. O'Rourke was a native of Dublin, Ireland, where he was born seventy-five years ago. He came to this country about sixty years ago and for a time resided in Quebec. He afterwards removed to Moncton.

### THIS MORNING IN THE COMMONS

#### Amendment To The Daylight Saving Act

#### The Appointment of Colonel Labat—Sir Wilfrid and The C. G. R.—Change Made in Criminal Code

Ottawa, May 10.—Sir G. P. Foster this morning submitted a bill amending the daylight savings act, to insure that the time shall not be advanced more than one hour beyond standard time in each province.

Major-General Newburn spoke in connection with the appointment of Col. R. H. Labatt on the board of pension commissioners. Colonel Labatt, Major-General Newburn said, was not his brother-in-law, and his appointment was made in 1916, before he became a member of the present government.

The minister of militia added that he had nothing to do, directly or indirectly, with the appointment, although when Colonel Labatt was offered the appointment, he had advised him not to take it because he had a large practice, and he thought the strain would be too much for him.

Major-General Newburn added that Colonel Labatt served through the north-west rebellion as a private and was one of the most experienced Canadian officers.

#### The War Draft

Replying to a question by Jacques Bureau (Three Rivers), Major-General Newburn said it was not the desire of the militia department to draft any but men in category "A" at the present time. All men reporting would, of course, be given another medical examination before their category was definitely determined.

Leaving to another question by Mr. Bureau, the minister of militia said that some men who have been placed in category "B" had also to be re-examined.

**The C. N. R.**  
Hon. A. K. Maclean's resolution for assisting the Canadian Northern Railway Company or any company in this system in renewing or postponing the payment of its indebtedness, was carried, and a bill based on it given first reading.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that the opposition was not in possession of information which it should have before this bill was discussed. They could not discuss the matter intelligently without knowledge about it.

Mr. Maclean promised to lay all information upon the table of the house, or to give a statement at once if the bill was given second reading and the house went into committee on it.

The second reading of the bill was postponed to allow second reading without reference to the bill.

Sir Robert Borden—"Well we are proposing to feed our own men." Second reading of the bill was deferred until the leader of the opposition had an opportunity to receive and peruse papers furnished to him by the minister of finance.

**Amending Criminal Code.**  
Second reading of the bill was given to Hon. C. J. Doherty's bill to amend the criminal code and the house resolved itself into committee. The bill in the main, seeks to raise the age of consent from sixteen to eighteen years of age.

There was considerable discussion of a sub-section in the bill which provided that "no male person under the age of twenty-one shall be prosecuted for any offence under the provisions of this section."

E. B. Doolin (Wright), referred to the sub-section as one of the most damnable pieces of legislation he had ever seen brought before the house. He would prefer an amendment making a man liable to six years' imprisonment instead of two, and cutting off the age of consent. The sub-section, he said, was really giving permission to all young men of twenty years of age and such legislation should not be tolerated.

Mr. Stacey (Westminster) urged that the age of twenty years in the sub-section should be reduced to eighteen.

Mr. Doherty accepted the suggestion of Mr. Stacey, and amended the clause reducing the age from twenty-one to eighteen years.

#### CARS FALL FROM A TREESTRUCK, SOLDIERS KILLED.

Columbia, S. C., May 10.—Between ten and fifteen soldiers were killed and many probably fatally injured when three passenger coaches loaded with members of the 321st Infantry and the 317th machine gun company fell from a trestle near Camp Jackson today.

### THE FOOD BOARD REGULATIONS AND THE PENALTIES

There are many enquiries as to the new food board regulations. The law provides that no person living at a less distance than two miles from a licensed dealer shall hold or have in his possession more flour or sugar than is sufficient for his ordinary requirements for a period not exceeding thirty days.

Anyone living more than five miles and less than ten miles from a licensed dealer may have sufficient for his ordinary requirements up to sixty days. A person living more than ten miles from such dealer may have sufficient for his ordinary requirements for a period up to 120 days.

The violation of any of the provisions of the law makes the offender liable to a fine of from \$100 to \$1,000 or imprisonment for a period about three months of both fine and imprisonment.
