LAMBS FOR WINTER.  
Sussex Record—Large shipments of lambs have been going forward to the Winnipeg market during the last few weeks from Sussex. This trade has now assumed very large proportions. No trouble is experienced in selling good New Brunswick stock to westerners, who prefer the lamb of this province to the stock grown on the prairies. The animals come from all over New Brunswick, but the North Shore furnishes a big percentage of the supply.
