The deceased has been for a long time employed of the staff of the provincial printing office. After an illness of a short duration he passed away this morning at St. Joseph's hospital.

He was the son of an English barrister and was born at Norwich 75 years ago. The family came to Canada in the early '50's. The eldest son, Lieut. Arthur Holloway, dying in India a few years ago.
