The trouble occurred overawavine where there had been a sink in the days of the construction of the C. P. R., and workmen have reported finding kegs of spikes and steel rails in the dump beside the track, as if it had been the spot where a construction train had been lost.

All night the C. P. R. had four hundred men and four work trains filling in the gap, which was even hundred feet long, and had the line open at 8 o'clock this morning.
