DR. CRAPSEY'S NEW CREED.
He Predicts the Speedy Decline of the Old.
It Has Been Condemned, He Says, by the Enlightened Conscience of the Age—New System Teaches Salvation by Love.

ROCHESTER, Jan. 29.—The Rev. Dr. Crapsey delivered the last of his series of four lectures on "The Present Crisis in the Churches" this evening in the Lyceum Theatre. His subject was "The Great Reconciliation."

Dr. Crapsey began his lecture by a reference to the prophet Jeremiah, to whom the word of the Lord came saying, "See, I have this day set thee over the nations and over the kings, to root out, and to pull down, and to destroy, and to throw down, to build, and to plant." He said in part: "The work laid upon the prophet by these words was both destructive and constructive. The work of destruction came first. Jeremiah gave notice to the king, the priests, and the people of the people of the speedy overthrow of their powers. He said the Chaldeans should come and lay waste the cities of Judah, burn the temple with fire and carry the people into captivity with their king, their princes and their priests."

EARTH BLOCKS RAILWAY TRAFFIC

LONDON, Ont., Jan. 29.—Thousands of tons of earth, covering an area of several blocks in extent and sixty feet high, crashed down about three-quarters of a mile from the Hyde Park on the north track of the Grand Trunk about nine o'clock this morning. Workmen, tearing that a landslide had occurred, dug away the earth from the embankment for many yards. This alone prevented the whole line from being buried under sixty feet of solid earth. The big slip was entirely unexpected, but fortunately the trains were all past and no workmen were in the vicinity. Supt. Ferguson procured a supply of dynamite, and it is expected that the line will be open again for traffic inside of 48 hours.

WINNIPEG HAS A \$210,000 FIRE
WINNIPEG, Jan. 29.—A fire, the loss from which is estimated at \$210,000, broke out here last night in the premises of J. D. King & Co., shoe manufacturers, Toronto. In the same building were the warehouses of Copeland, Chatters Company, Toronto; W. Patterson & Co., Bradford, and other firms. The building in which these firms are located was gutted, the loss being \$40,000, insurance \$24,000. The fire brigade with their new equipment worked well, and in spite of the fire kept the flames from spreading to other buildings. The cause of the fire is unknown.
