TORONTO, Aug. 4.—The Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen executive met at Port Dalhousie Saturday morning. A. G. Macdonald, M. P., in the chair, and representatives from Winnipeg, Ottawa, St. Catharines, Don Williams, Kenora, Lechmere, Don and Argonauts Toronto rowing club, being present.

O'Neill, of the St. Mary's club of Halifax received the endorsement of the association and will be allowed to enter the National regatta at Philadelphia as St. Mary's Club joined the C. A. A. O.

The Ottawa club was granted permission to compete in the Canadian Henley without Fulford and Moore who have been suspended.

A committee was appointed to interview the railway commission to procure better transportation for racing boats.

The second and closing day of the Henley regatta was marked by threatening weather, though the crowd was larger.

In the final heat of the junior fours the Toronto club's coxswain made a mistake and steered for the Argonauts' flag. At the turn the judges called them back and ordered a fresh start.

The Don R. C. Toronto, and the Metropolitan R. C., New York, were the only starters in the last heat of the senior doubles, the crews being Jacobs stroke, Fowler bow for Don, and Fussell and Dunn for the Metropolitan. The Don won by six lengths in 3.34.

In the junior fours, the Don's were first, Argos second, and Ottawa third. Time, 3.21.

THREE RECORDS BROKEN IN ANNUAL CONTESTS OF N. E. ASSOCIATIONS
Eighteen Year Old Boy Ran Splendid Race in Five Mile Event and Won Easily

BOSTON, Aug. 3.—Three records were broken and two were equalled at the annual championship track and field games of the New England Amateur Athletic Association, which were held at the Locust street grounds today. A. Roy Welton, a boy about 18 years old, attached to the Lawrence Y. M. C. A., ran a mastery race in the five mile event and won easily, having a lap and a half over his nearest competitor. The records broken were: One-mile run, won by James J. Sullivan of the South Boston A. C., in 4 minutes 23 3/4 seconds, displacing the record of 4 minutes 44 seconds held by T. F. Reader of the Boston A. A.; the half mile, which was won by the former champion, J. H. Sheehan of the South Boston A. C., who today in one minute 58 1/2 seconds displaced his old time form, and in the broad jump, where Edward L. Farrell of the South Boston A. C., covering 22 feet 3 inches, winning over the former record holder, Thomas P. Cronin of the St. Alphonsus A. C., whose mark was 22 feet.

In the 100 yards and 130 yard high hurdles the former records were equalled, the dash being covered in 10:15 seconds, and the hurdles in 17:35 seconds. The winners of the different events were:
